

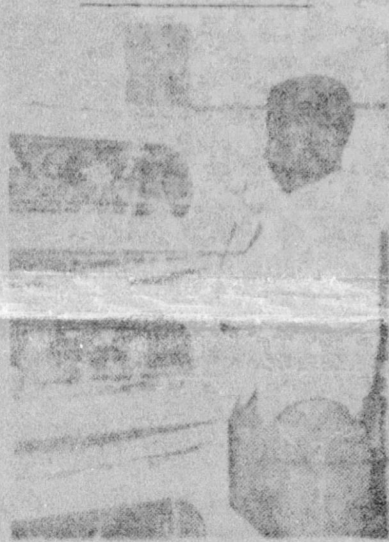
# Better Home Life Hub Of Rural Meet

There are fifteen communities in the county and eight of them were represented at a meeting that was held at Shawtown School, recently, where the plan was outlined. The program was not only accepted by those who attended the meeting, but was also carried to the other seven communities.

It was to be expected that better ways of raising crops of the family type would be discussed. The raising of chickens was one of the topics that were discussed. It was shown that better homes could be built with conveniences that would not only save the householders, but would aid the health of the family and the community. The raising of chickens is a better home life. The County Farm Agent, How Mary could take advantage of the Home Extension program and be able to raise on growing food, taking care of the home and pre-

paring for the little one, did not go unnoticed. Mr. Benson and Mrs. Hinnant have high hopes for the 1952 program and see nothing that will not make it work. Mrs. Hinnant is a native of Wilson and has been working here for ten years. She is a member of the Baptist Church.

# Harnett Ag Teacher Has Extension Program

DUNN — Curtis C. Ray, Harnett County Farm Agent, outlined to the Carolinian one of the most extensive programs to be found in the state, in an exclusive interview here last week.

Students who attended Harnett High School and the large number of adults who attend evening classes are getting a course in Field Work which covers two essential features of farm life, Soil Testing and Project Work.

These two play a big part in what the returns will be from the yield. Soil testing determines what crops are best suited for the land tested.

The Day School students, which consist of seventy, are given systematic instructions in agriculture. Progress made by these students enables Mr. Ray to determine the aptitude of the student and in this way he can tell, in a measure, how successful he might be as a farmer.

The adults, along with the students, are told of the many benefits to be derived from chemicals in combating weeds and plant disease. Diversified farming is the keynote to the entire program. How to make farming a year round, profit making vacation is the prime purpose of this course.

Poultry, swine and dairy cows are given special attention, due to the fact that these phases of the farm have made great strides in the county. Mr. Ray has been
