
- Tea not only aids digestion but relaxes the body, relie es nervous tension and provides a pick-up which most folks need-especially parents after a busy day.

phrents after a busy day. To make a good, full-bodied pot of tea for the family meal, it's important to follow the Four Golden Rules—just as it's important to follow a cake racine precisely. The rules are simple—(1) always use a teapot (2) use 1 teaspoonful of tea or 1 tea bag per cup (3) bring fresh water to a full-rolling boil and (4) brew 3-5 minutes.

A surprise main dish, save to please the family is Duck Hawaiian. DUCK HAWAHAN

(Makes 4 to 6 servings.)

Cut 1 5-6 lb. Long Island duckling, dressed weight, into serving pieces. Remove skin; place duck preces in mining bowl. Combine 2 tableshowns kitchen bouquet, 'a cup lemon juice, 1 clove garlic finely minced; pour over duck. Marinate 45 minutes turning occassionally. Melt 2 tablespoons duck fat in heavy frying pau. Brown pieces of duck on all sides. Add 1 cup upsweetened pin-apple juice and any left-over marinade. Cover tightly; simmer until duck is tender-about 45 minmarinade. ## Southern Bell To Lay Transoceanic Cable

Laving of the world's first the summer of 1956. begin June 22, it was announced |

here recently by E. A. Clement, District Manager of Southern Bell Telephone Company.

The transatlantic voiceways are to be extended 300 miles westward from New foundland to the eastern tip of Nova Scotia via another submarine cable, and from there to the United States over a 575-mile radio relay system. The project is a joint undertak-ing of American Telephone and The Telegraph Company, the British Post Office and Canadian Overseas Telecommunication Corporation and will cost about \$40,-000,000. Service will be established

#### late in 1956.

Mr. Clement quoted Henry T. Killingsworth, Vice President of American Telephone and Telegraph Company in charge of the Long Lines Department, as saying the first cable of a twin cable system would be spun out across 2 000 miles of ocean bottom by summer's end. Summer is the only time the Atlantic is calm enough to permit such an un-dertaking. Laying operations will start at Clarenville, Newfoundland, and be completed at Oban, which is on the west coast of Scotland about 60 miles from Glasgow.
