State College Hints

TABLE ETIQUETE - Do you panic at the thought of setting a table for a party dinner-or even going to one and not knowing B. Kirk, Rachelle R. Richardson meeting of Washington's PTA, at which fork to use? There's no ber it's good etiquette to follow your hostess' lead. Don't start to eat until she does and then use the same piece of silver. The host sits at one end of the table, the hostess at the other end. A lady guest of honor is seated at her host's right; a gentleman guest of

honor at his hostess' right. PLACING SILVER-To set the table, use only pieces of silver necessary for the meal. Place silver about one inch from the edge of table, with pieces to be used first on outside. Knives and spoons go to the right of plate, forks to the left.

TABLE LINENS-Fold napkins square or rectangular and place to the left of forks. Tablecloth should overhand the table 10 to 15 inches and should be exactly centered on table. If you use place mats instead of a tablecloth, they should be set one inch in from the edge of the table.

GLASSWARE AND CHINA Glasses are placed to the right of each place setting and directly above the knives. Individual salts and peppers should be placed above the plate or between two
