HAMPTON, Va.—Mr. W. Barton Beatty, Jr., who has been Director of Public Relations at Hampton Institute from September 1947 until March 1955, has joined the United Negro College Fund Inc., making his headquarters in Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. Beatty, who had previously been on leave of absence to supervise UNCF campaigns in the Midwest, also served as Secretary of the Board of Trustees of CI from July 1950 to October 1954.

Mr. Beatty received his bachelor degree at Fisk University, has done further study at Howard University and the University of Michigan, and holds the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters from Bishop College, Marshall, Texas. He served as principal of an elementary school in Cairo, Ill., as Boys' Work Director of the St. Augustine Branch of the Y.M.C.A. in Detroit, Michigan, and Executive Director of the Moorland Branch of the Y.M.C.A. in Dallas, Texas.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Howard University President Mervin W. Johnson Friday conferred degrees upon 564 graduates at the University's 88th annual commencement.

Woman Trumpeter Is Newest Cult Leader

NDOLA, Northern Rhodesia (ANP)—A trumpet-playing African woman is the new spiritual leader of a religious cult which has 100,000 followers in Northern Rhodesia and Nyasaland, according to a missionary living in the area. The woman, Lenishina Alice, started preaching two years ago after claiming Christ spoke to her in a vision and placed a Bible in her hand.

She has named the religious movement "Alice" and is estimated to have amassed a small fortune by African standards through the money brought her by natives from as far away as Tanganyika who seek her protection against witchcraft. The missionary said Alice's method of preaching is to turn her back on the congregation and blow the trumpet until she goes into a trance. Then an elder in the church tells the listeners the message she gives.

White Politicians

Want Negroes Out Of City Limits

DELRAY BEACH, Fla. (ANP)—Stirred by a month of racial tension over the city's recreational facilities, the Delray Beach city commission voted 4 to 1 last week to ask the Florida legislature to exclude "the entire Negro area" from the city limits.

City Atty. John Adams asked special counsel John Moore to draft a bill and "to take all necessary and required steps incident to having the same enacted into law as soon as possible."

Three weeks ago the city commission integrated its recreational facilities but rescinded the order a few days later after a near riot between Negro and white citizens over the use of the municipal swimming pool and local beaches.

between a group of white men and several Negro teenagers. Prior to that, Negro citizens at Delray Beach had filed suit to break down the segregation barriers. The suit was dropped when the commission ordered integration.
