## Shriners Raise Funds To Fight Tuberculosis

NASHVILLE, TENN. (AP) — Members of the Shrine temple here have begun a drive to bring part of their national organization's \$127,000 Tuberculosis and Cancer Research Foundation fund here for deposit.

W. H. Fort, illustrious potentate of the Nashville lodge, and H. D. Stuart, past potentate, Monday deposited the first \$5,000 in the Citizens Savings Bank and Trust Company, while 12 other local temples were depositing \$60,000 in banks across the country.

Future periodic deposits will bring additional amounts of the big total here, Fort said.

GOLDSBORO — Henry C. Mitchell, 37, Carolinian news correspondent and local businessman, was cited here last week for "Outstanding Accomplishments" by the Dillard High School Alumni Association on the occasion of the 30th year of accreditation celebration at the school.

Mr. Mitchell, a 1937 graduate, was honored for his fine work as a CAROLINIAN news writer and as a two-time award-winning Avon Cosmetics salesman, even though he has been bed-ridden for the past 7 1/2 years.

The presentation was made by Mrs. Geneva B. Hamilton, chairman of the award committee, at the alumni banquet held June 1 in the gymnasium of the East End School.

Mrs. Gloria B. Kirk, a 1937 graduate also and the 1956 alumni editor of the Dillard News, accepted the award on behalf of Mitchell, who could not be present.

A 12-year victim of Atropic Arthritis, Mitchell is a former student at Elizabeth City State Teachers College and brother of noted attorney Samuel S. Mitchell of Raleigh.

Awards were also presented to Miss C. E. Hatcher, who is retiring this year from the high schools; and Hugh V. Brown, principal of Dillard High School since 1923.

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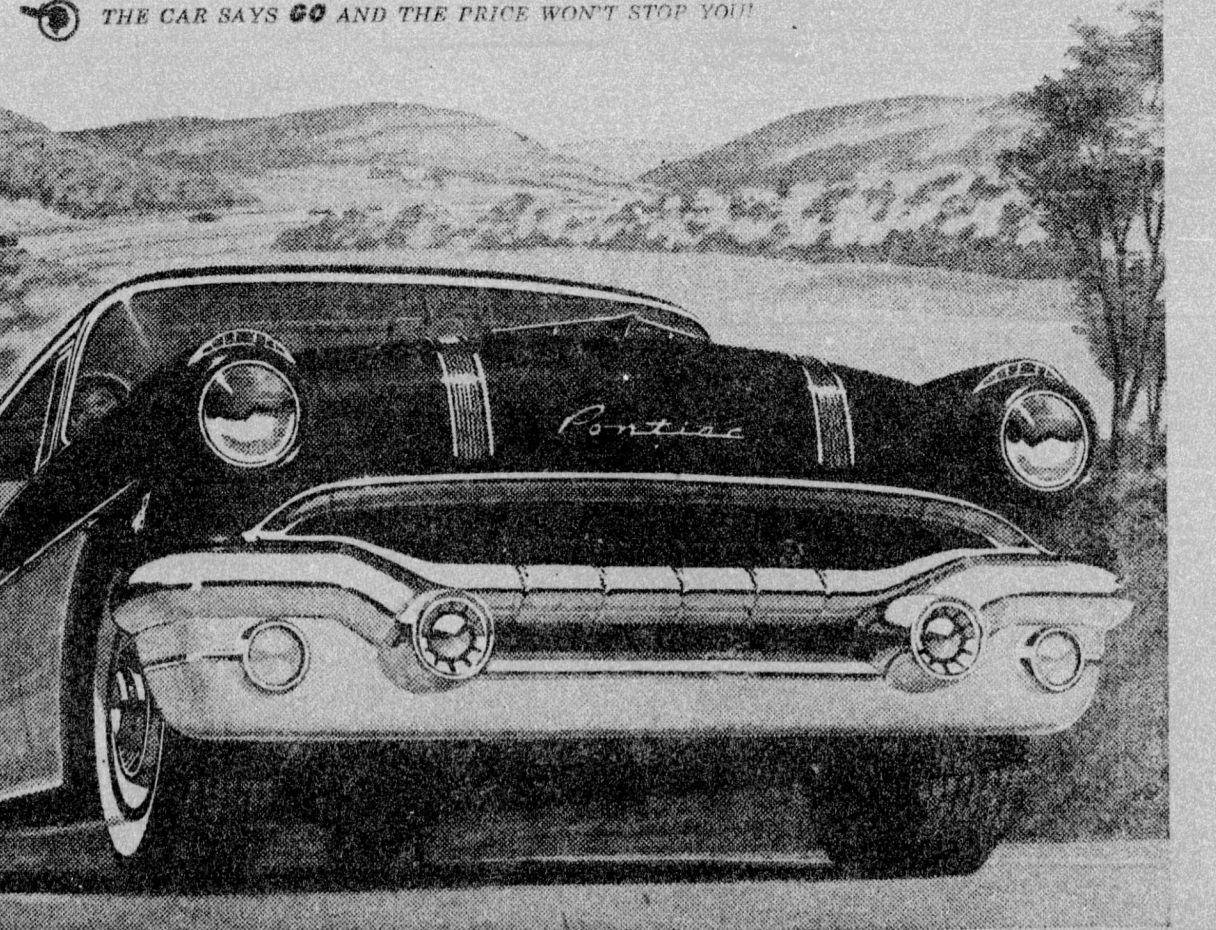
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
