

BURLINGTON - Arrested on the unusual charge of "failure to aid a police officer.' John Gattis, 27, was later relessed under \$100 bond

Gattis reportedly refused to help a local police officer to place a woman, charged with drunkenness, into a police car. When the officer asked him to hold open the oar door. Gattis is alleged to have repiled:

"You do it, you're wearing the badge.." The officer did it but returned a short time later with a warrant which authorized the arrest of Gattis for allegedly violating a state
