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Olympic Aces Arrive In Australia, Eye Gold Medals

MELBOURNE, Australia — (AP) — What is perhaps the greatest contingent of Negro track stars ever to represent this country in Olympic competition arrived in Melbourne last week.

Many of them are expected to return with gold medals, emblematic of their supremacy in particular events. Regarded as probable first place winners are the following:

Charlie Dumas, high jumper; Rafer Johnson, decathlete; Lou Jones, 400 meters; Greg Bell, broad jump; Lee Calhoun, 110 high hurdles; and Arnie Sewell, 800 meters.

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Indiana star who is now wearing the colors of the Navy... Johnnie, incidentally, will be one of the three top performers in the broad jump. This event, however, is expected to be won by the 25-year-old Bell, an Indiana sophomore, who has jumped more than 26 feet on several occasions.

Calhoun is in for a keen battle for his gold medal. His rival will be teammate Jack Davis of the Navy, who lost to Harrison Dillard in the 110 high hurdles in the 1932 games in Helsinki. In the Olympic tryout finals at Los Angeles, Davis and Calhoun finished in a dead heat.

Sowell, the fluent middle-distance star from the University of Pittsburgh, will be trying to avenge a stunning defeat by Tom Courtney in the Los Angeles meet when the two toe the mark in the Olympics. They are expected to run one-two in the 800 meters.

Chicago (AP) — The National Basketball Association champions last season, lost one of their key players when Tom Gola entered the armed services. But Hal Lear, the former Negro star at Temple University, might more than fill Gola's shoes.

For two seasons, Temple basketball coach Harry Litwick, insisted that Lear was one of the finest collegiate players, but the lithe sharpshooter really did not receive national acclaim until his superb exhibition in the NCAA tournament last spring.

The Owls finished in third place, behind the fan-studded San Francisco five and the remarkably balanced Iowa team. But the outstanding player was not the Dons' incomparable Bill Russell or the Hawkeyes' clever Carl Cain. The distinction belonged to Lear, as attested by the designation of him as the most valuable player of the tourney.

In five games he scored a record-shattering 190 points, reaching the zenith of his college career when he poured in 43 points against Southern Methodist, a record for a single NCAA tourney game.

Wearing the tag of All-American from several selections, Lear was the first draft choice of the warriors, a team with nine returning veterans.

31 Rattler All-Americans Honored At Homecoming

TALLAHASSEE—A warm tribute was paid during recent homecoming ceremonies to the 31 grid players who have made the mythical All-American team playing under the colors of Florida A and M University.

The "tribute to Rattler All-Americans" was made by Dr. B. L. Perry, dean of students, and the response was made by Atty. Johnny Howard of Elyria, Ohio. Atty. Howard was named to the 1944 All-American team.

The Rattlers' opponents for the homecoming grid battle was their arch rival, the North Carolina A and T Argies, coached by Bill Bell and Murray Neeley. Bell was former Rattler coach, and Neeley was an All-American tackle while playing under Bell and Gaitner in '38.

Macon "Body Builder" Williams, halfback in '42, Robert

They are probably the only college in the nation with a pair of twin halfbacks. The team also has three other tan players. The twins are Bill and Jim Wilkey, seniors who played high school football for Cleveland Adams High School in John-land, Both will be lettering in football at Kent State for the third season. Both are first stringers this season.

In two years prior to this season, Bill belted 510 yards in rushing and Jim 457. This year Bill has 22 and Jim 133 in six games, averaging better than four yards a play.
