Keynotes At Shaw U.:

"Younger Generation Must Have Philosophy," Dr. Jenkins Says

FALEIGH—Dr. Martin D. Jenkins, president of Morgan State College, Baltimore, Maryland told Shaw University students at vespers Sunday that the younger generation is confronted with the task of having a personal philosophy to guide himself as an individual in solving problems in Community Relations, Work Areas, and in Personal Development.

He stated that Negro students everywhere are under attack for not measuring up to American norms of performance. He urged that college students place more emphasis on the academic phase of college life rather than fraternal organizations or superficial athletics.

Dorie Miller Awards To Three Prominent Leaders

CHICAGO — (AP) — Three prominent Negro leaders are to receive the 1956 Dorie Miller Memorial Foundation awards for their outstanding contributions toward world understanding and peace.

Receiving the awards at a Dec. 7 banquet will be the Rev. Martin Luther King of Montgomery, Ala., president of the Montgomery Improvement Association and pastor of the Dexter Ave. Baptist Church; Claude A. Barnett of Chicago, director of the Associated Negro Press; and Dr. Joseph H. Jackson of Chicago, president of the National Baptist Convention and pastor of the Olivet Baptist Church here.

Announcement of the recipients was made by Rev. Elmer L. Fowler, president of the Dorie Miller Foundation.

The Foundation each year selects eminent leaders to name outstanding organizations and individuals to receive the annual awards.

Rev. King, staunch leader in the efforts to improve Negro benefits, will receive the Social Science award. Mr. Barnett and Dr. Jackson will receive awards for their contributions toward world peace and understanding.

Mr. Barnett has aided in increasing American understanding of Africa and the West Indies. Rev. Fowler said. He added that Dr. Jackson's prodigious missions to Europe and Russia have contributed much to peace and understanding.

The Dorie Miller Foundation was established in honor of the Negro Navy man who was the American hero at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941 when he shot down five enemy planes after the Japanese attacked the island.

When his ship was torpedoed, Dorie Miller received the Navy Cross from the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Music was furnished by the University Choral Society.

The program was under the auspices of the Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity.

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The 65-year-old Alabama-born educator's reign as head of the school was marred by mob violence spurred by white racists who forced Mrs. Foster (Miss Lucy's married name) to flee for her life from the school campus last February.

Mrs. Foster was later expelled permanently from the school when she named Dr. Carmichael and other school officials in a suit charging that they conspired with him against her presence at the school.

Dr. Carmichael took over the presidency of the school in September, 1955.

Univ. President Named In Arthurine Lucy Case Quits

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — (AP) — Dr. Oliver C. Carmichael, president of the University of Alabama, when Mrs. Arthurine Lucy Foster was admitted to the all-white school, announced last week he would resign from the school in January.

Dr. Carmichael denied published reports that differences with university trustees led to the resignation.

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King Cole's Attacker Is Found Guilty

BIRMINGHAM — (AP) — Edgar Lee Vinson, 25-year-old Aniston (Ala.) white man who was charged with disorderly conduct in an attack on Nat "King" Cole last April during the singer's Municipal Auditorium appearance, was found guilty by a circuit jury here last week after 90 minutes deliberation.

The jury, in returning its verdict recommended a \$50 fine be levied against Vinson. This action is the result of an appeal from a recorder's court verdict which had given Vinson a \$100 fine and a six-month jail sentence.

Strange Family Partnership Ends Abruptly As Woman Goes To Court

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — (AP) — A strange suit, seeking to dissolve a family partnership, was heard in Chancery court here last week as a 49-year-old woman accused her brother-in-law of "playing God" and forcing his brothers' wives to have sexual relations with him or be damned to hell.

Mrs. Lillian Middleton filed the petition against Caliphos Middleton, an alleged leader of a family cooperative farm here since 1932, charging that he has assumed the role of "God" in recent years and that a great majority of them have fallen under "his hypnotic spell."

In the suit, Mrs. Middleton seeks to end the family tie.

She has already been granted a temporary injunction in the case.

According to Mrs. Middleton, she and her husband, Louis, went into the partnership with Caliphos and his wife in 1932 in Bartlett, Tenn. Then, in 1933, they were joined by Amos and Jess Middleton and their wives.

She says that the family farm covers 600 acres, has cars, trucks and other valuable equipment in addition to an \$11,000 bank account which they all were to share equally in the profits, leases, and operation of.

Mrs. Middleton's suit asserts that from the beginning of the partnership Caliphos assumed leadership

of the farm and opened a bank account in his own name.

She says the other brothers have nothing, save living expenses.

In addition, the complaint states that shortly after the partnership was formed, Caliphos assumed the role of a preacher and preached to members of the family.

She said that as part of the ritual, female members of the family must submit to sexual relations with Caliphos or "be damned to hell."

Mrs. Middleton stated that Caliphos abuses her when she refuses to submit to his indecent proposals.

The complaint further stipulates.
