Pvt. Ronald Glove of Ft. Bragg spent the weekend in Siler City visiting his parents and other relatives.

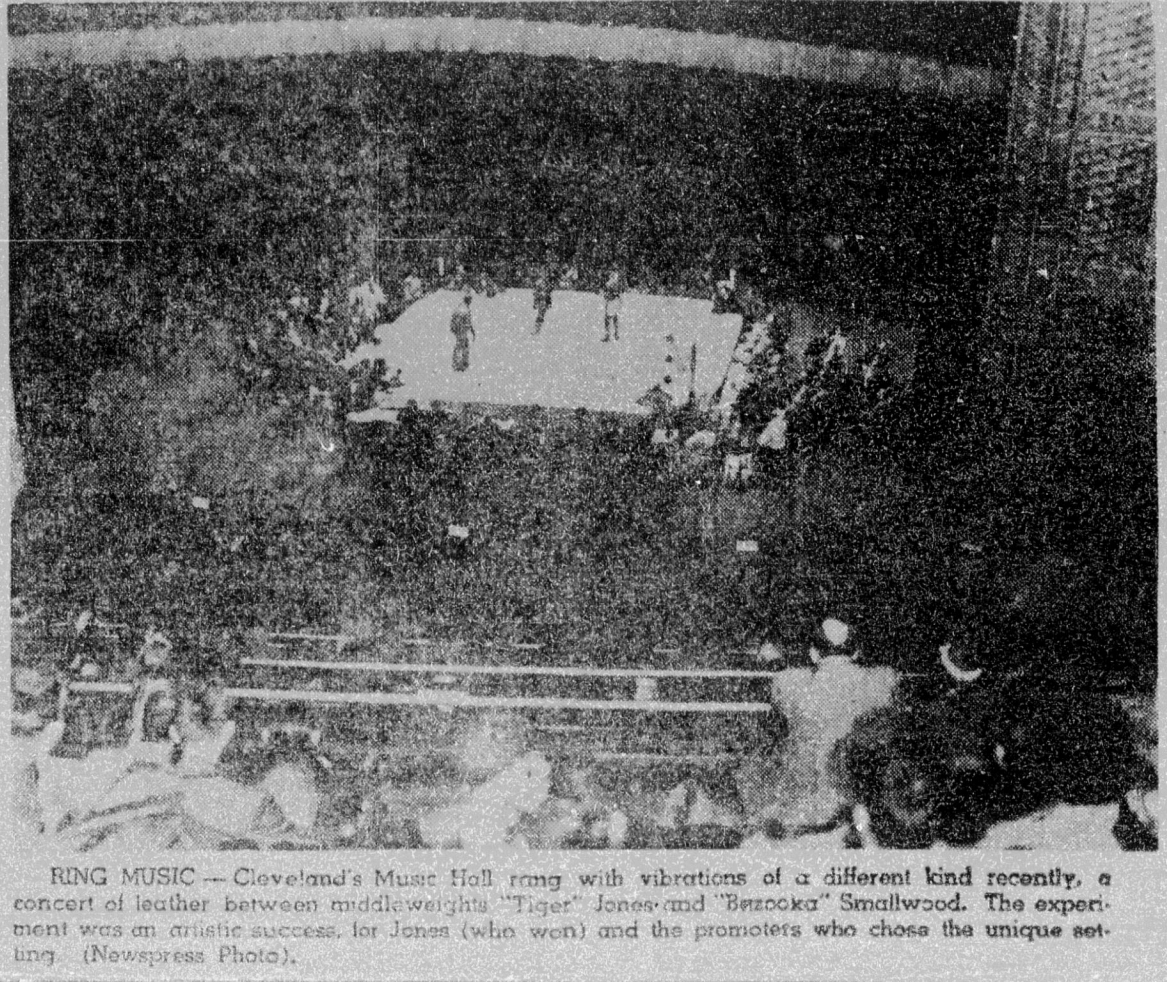
Mrs. Harrie D. Lee and children of East Goldston left recently for New York City.
