

STRAWBERRY CREAM ICEBOX CAKE

2 cups cold milk I cup whipping crean. packages strawberry 2 8-inch sponge cake instant pudding mix layers

Pour milk into mixing bowl. Add pudding mix and beat slowly with egg beater just until well mixed, about I minute. Do not overbeat; mixture will be thin. Let stand until slightly thickened-takes about 2 minutes. Whip the cream and fold it into the pudding. Cut the cake lavers through center horizontally, making 4 layers. Spread the mixture between layers and on tops and sides of cake. Garnish top of cake with mint leaves or fresh strawberries. Chili before serving.
