The filling is made with strawberry instant pudding and whipped cream. This is spread between split cake layers and on the top and sides, as pictured here. Fresh green mint leaves or fresh strawberries as garnish give it that "extra special" party look.

STRAWBERRY CREAM ICEBOX CAKE
2 cups cold milk 1 cup whipping cream
2 packages strawberry instant pudding mix 2 8-inch sponge cake layers
Pour milk into mixing bowl. Add pudding mix and beat slowly with egg beater just until well mixed, about 1 minute. Do not overbeat; mixture will be thin. Let stand until slightly thickened—takes about 2 minutes. Whip the cream and fold it into the pudding. Cut the cake layers through center horizontally, making 4 layers. Spread the mixture between layers and on tops and sides of cake. Garnish top of cake with mint leaves or fresh strawberries. Chill before serving.
