The 22-year-old second baseman earned the Louisville Slugger sil ver bat awarded by the Hillerick & Bradshy Co. to the champion batter in the minors for his perfornance with the Dubuqueta (Ia.) club of the Class D Midwest Lea-

This was the second time he had won such an award. He copped a similar trophy in 1951 when he was the leading hitter with a White Plains, N. Y. team in American Leagion Junior baseball program with a 408 average in tournament games

Jones is the property of the Chirago White Sox. Twice he has gone to the Tampa training base of the American League club. After his first season in organized baseball (1955), he was taken south by the White Sox. However, he developed arm trouble and was sent to Dubuque for the 1956 season.

In 1955, he had compiled a 318 average with the Waterloo (Ia.) team of the Three-I League He did not enter organized baseball until he finishd his collge work at Ithaca (N. Y.) College.

With the Packers last season, Jones rapped the ball with considerable power. In 100 games, he had 135 hits, including 26 homers, six triples and 25 doubles. He was voted the Midwest League's Most Valuable Player award.
