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**Attends National Convention**  
HIGH POINT — Miss Myrtle L. Gray, principal of Fairview Elementary School, has returned to the city after having attended two NEA conventions held in St. Louis, Missouri, and Cincinnati, Ohio, respectively.

The 12th annual meeting of the Association for Supervisors and Curriculum Development (ASCD) was held in St. Louis with headquarters in the Shearson, Jefferson and Stater Hotels.

The theme for the convention was "Education and the Future: Appraisal and Planning."

The detailed programs consisted of study-discussion groups, clinics, regional breakfast meetings, tours, open committee meetings, and commissions and small assemblies and host schools were open for field visits.

The general sessions highlighting the convention were top-flight educational leaders and lay people served as guest speakers, symposium leaders and panel moderators.

The annual meeting of the Department of Elementary School Principals (DESP) was held in Cincinnati with headquarters in the Netherland-Hilton and Sheraton-Gibson Hotels. The theme for the convention was "Improving Educational Opportunities for Children."

Approximately 4,000 Elementary School Principals concerned themselves with the aspects of problems taken up in the study-discussion groups, clinics, state breakfast meetings and assemblies.

While the general sessions were top spots of the convention, "The First Hundred Year" NEA centennial celebration pageant was the real highlight.

## Apartment House Fire Snuffs Out Lives Of 7 Youngsters

**PHILADELPHIA, PA. (AP)** — Seven children, ranging in age from 2 to 9, were burned to death here last week in an apartment house fire that started in the basement and swept through three stories of the building.

Dead in the tragic blaze are Edward Nelson, 2, his brother, Eddie, 3, and sister, Lorraine, 4; Jover Nelson, 3; Donice, 2; Franklin, 7; and Lester, 4.

The victims were the children of two sisters.

All seven children died huddled together in an effort to escape the searing flames.

Mrs. Doris Nelson, the mother of 3 of the children, suffered a fractured left arm and cuts when she leaped from windows to the street. Her sister, Mrs. Josephine Nelson, the mother of four of the children, suffered jaw fractures along with

a fifth child, Frederick Nelson, when they jumped to safety.

Cause of the fire was not determined, but firemen said it apparently started in the basement of a new house and spread rapidly throughout the building.
