His publications number some 230 titles on anatomical, anthropological and general medical subjects, many of which are cited in standard medical texts. A substantial portion of his writings has dealt with the exposition and elimination of racial discrimination in health areas.**

## Biography Of Rep. Bolton To Be Published May 15

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Longmans, Green, book publishers, announced here Monday, the forthcoming publication of "A Long Way Forward," a biographical study of the life of Congressman Frances P. Bolton, one of the few women in the U. S. congress, a member of the House Foreign Affairs committee and a prominent member of the board of trustees of Tuskegee Institute. The biography, to be published May 15, has been written by David Loth, well-known journalist who served as director of the Columbia University Bicentennial division in 1954.

**Loth reconstructs Mrs. Bolton's life from her childhood in Cleveland as a member of the city's oldest, wealthiest and most politically active families, to her position today as an influential GOP member of the House of Representatives — an indefatigable worker and traveler, who just**

**recently returned from a 23-nation tour of Africa as a member of Vice President Nixon's goodwill delegation.**

**The book cites Mrs. Bolton's interest in nursing, her years of work in promoting better education for nurses to meet patient needs, her contributions through the Payne fund to medical and educational research, her early interest in work done at Duke university in parasitology — now continuing in many other universities — and of her 17 years as a member of congress, a post she filled at the death of her husband.**

**Her recent years as member of the powerful affairs committee of the House of Representatives, her political campaigns, the measures she has introduced in the House, her associates, family life and trips abroad are all contained and treated extensively in the book.**

**This biographical study — in the advance of women's rights in the last half century — is the story of a humanist, philanthropist and a "Congressman's congressman," who has shunned the easy life of wealth to become one of the nation's most respected individuals.**

**The book, of 212 pages, is priced at \$5.**

## Air Force Vet Shoots Self In Head On Lawn Of Washington's Tidal Basin

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The scenic view of Tidal Basin was suddenly transformed into a death scene last Wednesday when a former Howard University student put a bullet through his brain as Cherry Blossom visitors strolled among the budding trees.

**Thomas F. Blackwell, Jr., an Air Force veteran was found on the grass not far from the roadway at the north side of the blossom-decorated basin with a bullet in his right temple and a .32 caliber revolver lying near his left hand.**

**A certificate of suicide was issued by Coroner A. Magruder McDonald. Blackwell was under indictment for the stabbing of his girl friend two months ago.**

**According to police, the Air Force veteran came to Washington in 1953 to attend Howard University. But he left school last November. Two months ago he was arrested**

**for assault with a deadly weapon after slaying Miss Lily B. Myers, a Library of Congress clerk, on Jan. 30. He then quit his job as orderly at Mount Alto Hospital and returned to his family home in Harrisburg, Pa.**

**He returned to Washington in the early morning on the eve of the Cherry Blossom festival, he called Miss Myers at the Library on finding that she was out of the office, he told her coworker to**

**tell her "good bye." When the woman asked if he could call back later he is reported as saying: "I won't be here later."**
