Hampton Players' Rendition Of "Ah, Wilderness" Is A Success

HAMPTON, VA. — The Hampton Institute Players successfully captured the depth of Eugene O'Neill's dramatic talent in the presentation of his sole comedy - "Ah, Wilderness" on April 12 in Ogden Hall.

The play is typically American in its appeal and account of conditions that may exist in any small town. Marilyn Fields, (education major, from Long Island, N. Y.) as Essie Miller, the wife and mother, was superb in facing and adjusting the many problems confronting her household. The interpretation of her role was near-professional.

Orlando Taylor (general studies from Chattanooga, Tenn.) as Nat Miller, in spite of a rather slow beginning, gave to his role the zest and dramatic spontaneity demanded. He progressively became master of the many situations in which he found himself.

John Vaughan Jr. (freshman from Phoenix, Va.), portraying the frustrated and timid son Richard, was very convincing. One could easily sense he had the true meaning of his role and even though at times he was not too sure of his lines, he captivated the audience with his sincerity.

The contributions of other members of the cast were notable and all effective. It was this total effectiveness that caused the comedy to be most enjoyable and interesting.

Mrs. Olivia Gates directed the play, and deserves praise for having done a fine job with a not too easy dramatic vehicle. The theater staff, under direction of Dr. Hugh M. Gloster, head of H's Communication Center, has again made a contribution to the cultural life of the campus and the community.

DETROIT (AP)—An all-white jury of six women deliberated only 34 minutes Thursday before Recorder's Judge Paul E. Krause before finding a 48-year-old housewife guilty of disturbing the peace in connection with a racial disturbance on Feb. 24. She is Mrs. Rose Marie Petransky.

Nine witnesses testified she shouted insulting remarks, "Nigger Lovers" to four white persons as they left the home of Mrs. Ethel Watkins, a colored seamstress who moved into the white neighborhood at 12356 Cherrylawn.

Mrs. Petransky's attorney, Donald W. Soregant, said he would appeal the verdict. Judge Krause set April 25 for sentence.
