NEW YORK (ANP)—Special to ANP)—The producer and one of the co-stars of the film, "Edge Of The City," were given special awards at a celebrity jammed cocktail party held at Mrs. Joe Louis' plush Long Island home.

Sidney Poitier, who has been mentioned for Academy Award nomination as a result of his brilliant performance in the NY dockside interracial drama, and producer David Susskind, who defied Hollywood tradition by casting Negro and white actors in a plot without regard to race, creed or color were the recipients of the awards by the Virgin Island Public Affairs Council and the Coordinating Council for Negro Performers, respectively.

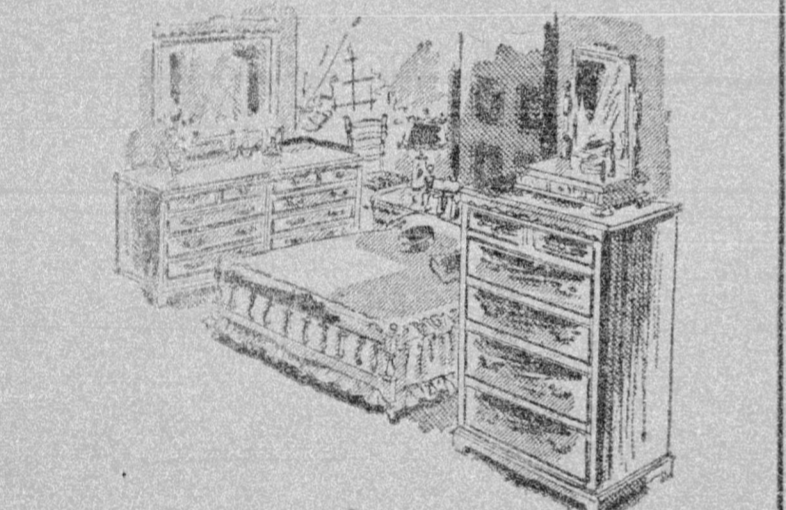
On the scroll given to Susskind by Leroy Burton, treasurer of the Coordinating group, he was cited for his "distinguished service and contribution toward the advancement of Negro performers and for his realistic portrayal of Negro life in America as it really is."

The Virgin Island organization, said that Poitier, as a native of the Bahamas, had risen thru hard work and talent, to a high spot in the movie industry and was a credit to his race.

Since it was released four months ago, "Edge Of The City" has been praised by movie critics and audiences alike as a vehicle packed with drama and excitement. While it wasn't a message film, it had an integrated cast which brought the comment from baseball star Larry Doby that it was a "home run for American Democracy."

AME Church Salutes Fathers, Mothers In Unique Ceremony

CHICAGO (ANP)—Scores of churchmen and women, among them numerous visiting ministers and dignitaries, participated in a salute to mothers and fathers program presented here last week in Quinn Chapel African Methodist Episcopal church to honor church members for their long and devoted service to the church.

Sponsored by the Chicago Conference of Laymen, the program honored members from eight AME churches whose contributions and services to their respective church bodies were borne out through long years of loyalty.

Among Churchmen and women church; Bethel AME church; Canaan AME church in Maywood; Gary First Church, and Quinn Chapel AME church, were honored in the program.

Among other dignitaries present were Dr. Philip Lewis, principal of Felsenthal elementary school here, Eugene O. Shands former NAACP official and director of public relations for Mid-America Enterprises here; Mrs. Lucy Rankin, a distinguished organist from St. Paul church, the only Negro AME church in Glenco, Ill., and Mrs. Theodore Richardson, wife of Rev. Richardson, pastor of Metropolitan Community church.

Recipients of the salute were highly praised by the Rev. Archibald J. Carey, at the close of the program. Rev. Carey is pastor of Quinn Chapel church, the oldest Negro AME edifice in the city.

The program was called "A Salute to Fathers and Mothers of African Methodism."

Justice Plaque To Dr. M. L. King

NEW YORK (ANP)—The 1957 Social Justice Awards of the Religious Labor Foundation were presented to the Rev. Martin L. King, Montgomery, Ala., bus boycott leader; Former Senator Herbert H. Lehman, and the Rev. John LaFarge, associate publisher of "America." The base relief plaques were awarded at a luncheon at the Sheraton-Astor Hotel.

Dr. King made a fervent plea for sincere efforts for the passage of civil rights legislation. He stated, "Oh, how I would that someone could get over to reactionary Senators and reactionaries in the executive branch of the Government that civil rights is not an ephemeral, evanescent domestic question to be kicked around by hypocritical politicians. God grant us leaders who are somehow calm yet positive."
