

Oriental Symbolism In Modern Design

Good fortune to him who sleeps here: that is the symbolism be-hind the motif which forms the pattern of "Chinese Coin," a new bedspread (above) designed by John and Earline Brice. The disk-like design, which has appeared throughout the ages in Chinese art forms, means variously good luck, fortune, wealth and happiness. "Oriental Theme," the design pictured below, traces its origin to an antique glazed tile found in Hong Kong. The "Chinese Coin" pattern is heavily embroidered in acetate yarn on an all-cotton, wrinkle-resistant Range Cloth.
