

Gilbert Tops Calhoun As Rams Win Carolina Relays

Olympic Champion Bows To Winston-Salem's Runner

DURHAM — Sophomore Brian Gilbert of Winston-Salem, who won a 141 victory over Olympic champion Lee Calhoun of Penn State in the 100-yard dash, today won the relay in a field of 14 college teams in the 1957 Carolina Relays. This time, however, Calhoun, who had won the 100-yard dash in 1954, was the low hurdle of a relay team which withdrew because of a runner's knee ailment. His winning time was 28.7.

The Rams scored victories in eight events to outpace a field that included runners to Hampton Institute, 32; West N.C., 29; St. Augustine's 13; A&T, 10; Fayetteville, 1; LaSalle, Virginia State 7; and Clifton and Johnson C. Smith, 2 each. Records were broken in the 220-yard dash, the two mile run, and the 400-yard dash.

In the hurdles race, Gilbert and Calhoun started on virtually even terms and ran neck and neck until the 5th hurdle when Gilbert lunged a full yard ahead. Calhoun cleared the fifth with difficulty apparently aggravated by his knee's brush with the hurdle.

Charley Jenkins Sparkles At 67th Running Of Relays

PHILADELPHIA (AP)— Charley Jenkins, 21, of Villanova, today sparkled in the 100-yard dash at the 67th running of the Penn Relays at Franklin Field. Jenkins exhibited one of the most masterful displays of foot speed ever seen in the race, his overpowers drive in the final minutes of the race. Jenkins gave Villanova its fourth relay crown and labeled him the finest outstanding performer.

This time Jenkins was pursued right down to the wire by the Boston College runner, Morgan, who finished in 0:16.5. Jenkins and Delaney, who were on the Villanova distance relay team on opening day, also shined in fine performances in the 400-yard dash. Jenkins was clocked in 0:52.8, a second better than in the year before.

Winston-Salem made its presence known with a sparkling 450-yard shuttle hurdle win sparked by the quartet of Francis Washington, Carl Brown, Joe Middleton and Elias Gilbert. They breezed by Maryland and Navy in 0:59.8.
