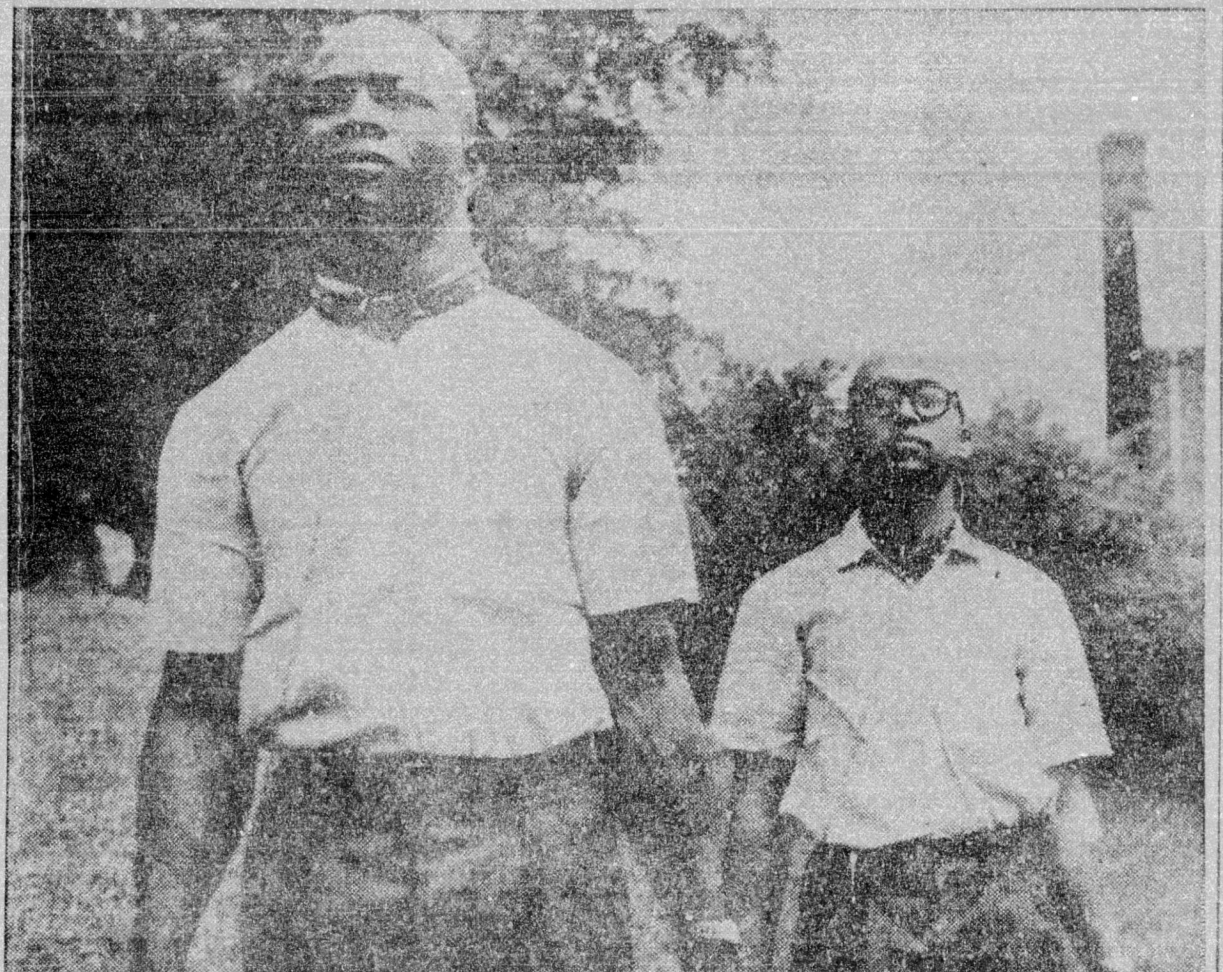

# Six Movies Will Be Released By Local Library During May

The Richard B. Harrison Public Library has the following films available for use of adult borrowers from now through May 31, 1957:

**IT'S EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS**, 20 minutes: This film explains how our business system built on a firm foundation of freedom, has given America the highest standard of living in the world. It dramatizes the dangers to our personal, political, and economic freedoms, and emphasizes the importance of protecting these freedoms.

**IT TAKES ALL KINDS**, 20 minutes: Shows a series of young people, each one reacting to a similar love situation. They are seen with members of the opposite sex so that the audience can get an insight into the possibilities for success or failure in marriage, should they select each other.

**LEVITTOWN, PENNSYLVANIA**, 25 minutes: Describes the completely pre-planned community of Levittown in Bucks County, Pa., which when completed, will have 16,000 homes housing 70,000 people. Presents Bill and Alfred Levitt who discuss their philosophy of building and the problems encountered in planning the city.

**LIVING IN A METROPOLIS (GREATER NEW YORK)**, 20 minutes: Huge cities, commonly referred to as metropolises, have grown up in the last century as trading, transportation, and manufacturing centers to serve the needs of people in an industrialized commercial nation. The giant city of New York is this film. The portrayal of the fact that in New York City millions of people of different cultural and racial backgrounds live together in peace, all eventually becoming Americans, makes this an exceptional engrossing film story.

**MONARCH BUTTERFLY**, 20 minutes: Portrays the four stages in the life cycle of the monarch butterfly. Close-up photography depicts the monarch laying its eggs and shows the caterpillar eating its way out of the egg, feeding, molting, forming its chrysalis, and emerging as a butterfly.

**PAINTING: LEARNING TO MIX COLORS**, 4 minutes: First the importance of color in art and everyday life is emphasized. The three primary colors are mixed with one another to make secondary colors. Then the primary colors are mixed in various proportions to make a variety of shades. Different colored articles demonstrate that all colors are made from mixtures of the three primary colors.

# Powell Gets 'Race Designation' Removed From Passenger Lists

WASHINGTON — (AP)— Congressman Adam Clayton Powell (D-N. Y.) was informed this week of the deletion of the word "race" from the passenger lists of the Panama Canal Company.

Banning segregation by this company is the result of a year-long fight waged by the New York congressman. Powell began working on this issue last August after it had been brought to his attention by Judge Jane Bolin of the Domestic Relations Court in New York.

Powell protested this policy in a letter to Edward Harms, an official of the Panama Line, and was later informed that the racial designation was used at the request of the Panamanian Government. He then got in touch with the Panamanian Ambassador Don Joaquin Jose

Vallarino on this question. Powell received a letter from Ricardo M. Arias, new Ambassador of Panama last month explaining that the Panama Company had been complying with an order by the Panamanian Government in August 1949, and that the Government had issued another order in December 1956 which superseded the former letter.

This information was passed on to an executive of the Panama Line who wrote Powell that "the word 'race' will be struck from the Panama Line information sheets." And that "all agents have been notified accordingly and future printings of these forms will have the proper deletion."

# Book Bazaar Planned

PETERSBURG, Va. — The Library Science Department of Virginia State College, Petersburg, will sponsor a Book Bazaar beginning Wednesday, May 8, and continuing through Thursday, May 15, it was announced by college officials today. Exhibits will be in Room 305, Johnston Memorial Library on the campus.

1,000 books which have been supplied by the Children's Book Council of New York City and are the products of sixty-four different publishers will be exhibited. The collection includes a variety of types of books on many subjects including music, art, religion, fairy

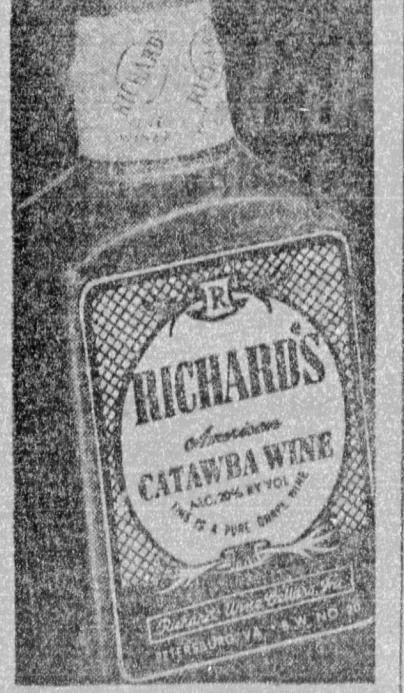
