

Lincoln U.'s "J" School To Have New Curriculum

JEFFERSON CITY, MO. — A new journalism curriculum will go into effect at Lincoln University (Mo.) with the fall semester of 1957, following a report by the College Publics committee to the effect that the plan meets the requirements for a bachelor of arts degree.

Planning for the curriculum has been going on since two years ago when the decision was made to convert the School of Journalism into a department of the College of Arts and Sciences.

The purpose is to integrate the curriculum into the college system in order to serve the needs of students in all departments as well as those anticipating careers in journalism.

According to Lee S. Cole, acting head of the department, the curriculum new look is an effort to provide students with courses which will better enable them to exploit skills developed in other areas of the university as business, the sciences, art, etc.

The program still provides for the cultural background necessary for successful careers in profes-

sional communications and special studies and practices that will fit students for work on business, advertising, news, and editorial staffs of publications; in teaching, public relations and research. The new program also offers a minor in journalism for students of all departments.
