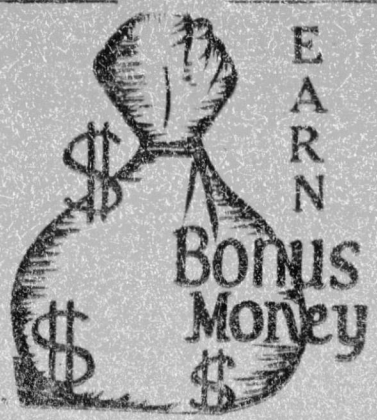

CHARLOTTE — Dr. Rufus Patterson Perry, administrative dean and vice president of Langston University, Langston, Oklahoma, is the new president of Johnson C. Smith University, officials of the Charlotte institution announced Saturday. The 53-year-old native of Georgia is a graduate of Johnson C. Smith University, holds the degrees of master of science and doctor of philosophy from Iowa State University and the degree of doctor of laws from his alma mater.

He taught chemistry and served as director of the division of arts and sciences at Prairie View State College in Texas before accepting his present position as vice-president, administrative dean, and professor of chemistry at Langston University.

Dr. Perry is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Rapist May Die For '56 Crime In S.C.

COLUMBIA, S. C. — The State Supreme Court Monday upheld the death sentence for Willie Marion Daniels, 29, for the rape of a white woman in February, 1956.

The court notified the State Penitentiary that Daniels, a former wood cutter, should be executed June 7.

Daniels was sentenced to the mandatory death penalty last year by circuit judge J. Henry Johnson.

"Lord God Almighty, have mercy," Daniels said when he learned of the Court's decision. "Forgive me and forgive everybody that's concerned."

Daniels was convicted of the rape and robbery of the middle-aged Allendale white woman.

"Invitations Stand," Gov. Stanley Says

RICHMOND, Va. — This state's governor, Thomas B. Stanley, breaking silence on the night-week controversy over invitations sent out by mistake to Negroes for an all-white banquet for distinguished Virginians, said last Wednesday, "So far as I am concerned, the invitations stand."

The governor had not made any comment during a period in which some of the Negroes were asked to return their invitations and said they would do so only at the request of

Raleigh School Board Adopts Assignment Plan

In a move to keep racial segregation in the Raleigh Public Schools for at least one more year, the Raleigh School Board moved Tuesday to assign all students to their present schools for the ensuing school year.

Also adopted by the six-member board was a pupil assignment plan, which allows dissatisfied parents to appeal to the School Board.

The resolution which assigned all pupils to their respective schools for next year was introduced by Leroy Martin and seconded by the only Negro member of the board, Fred J. Carnegie, Raleigh attorney. The resolution received unanimous approval. The meeting was held in the school superintendent's office on New Bern Avenue.

A closed door meeting was held almost an hour before the regular meeting opened. The superintendent's secretary is alleged to have carefully guarded entrance to the room.
