Although many things have changed in life, the family is still the most important tie. Have your child to feel loved and belonged. Let him have a feeling of security. Women should portray a moral life that girls and boys can look up to.

The church and Sunday School are most important aspects of a child's life. There is something else besides money, cars, a fine home, dresses and friends. Teach your child to budget, not only money but time. After all women possess most of the world's money. Statistics show that women own 40 of the world's real estate, inherit 870 life insurances and have other high monetary dividends.

Make your child independent. The family has a fine opportunity

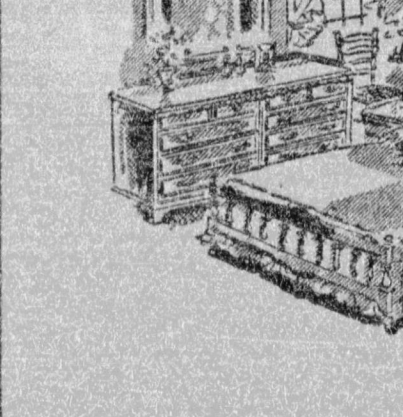

## Inaugural Flight Greeted By Police Band, Others In BWI

BRIDGETOWN, BARBADOS — This "sugar bowl" island in the British West Indies is the newest addition to the timetable of an internationally-known airline's worldwide routes.

The first plane arrived at Bridgetown at Noon Monday, May 13 after stops at Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Antigua, Martinique and Guadeloupe.

The Barbados Police Band, government and business leaders, and hundreds of cordial Barbadians greeted the inaugural flight from New York.

The Hon. M. E. Cox, Minister of Trade, Industry and Labor, welcomed officials aboard the inaugural flight and presented members of the House of Assembly, the Executive and Legislative Councils, the Executive Committee and other ministers.

Speaking for the airlines was an executive vice president, in charge of the Latin Division, who pledged that the airline will "intensify its efforts toward the further development of Barbados already well established tourist program."
