of the church and B. T. U. Owing to the pastoral duties of the father, the family is not engaged in any civic activities. However, they are active in school activities.

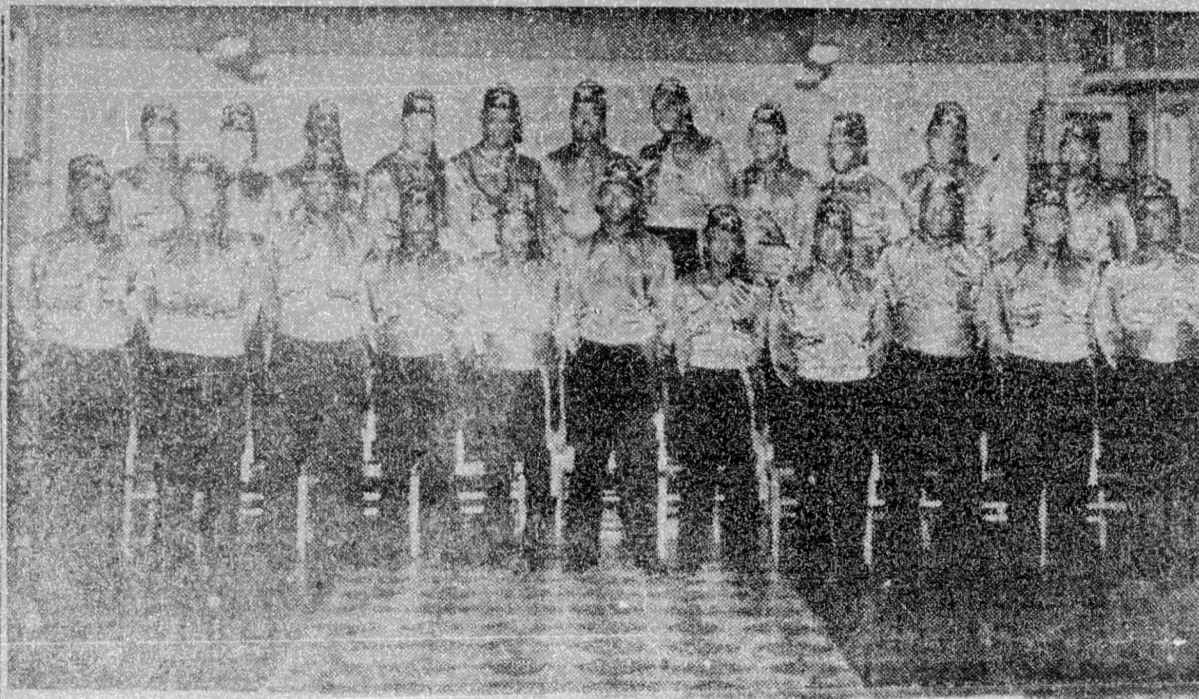

## Heroic Agents Honored

**BROOKLYN (AP)** — Detective Nathaniel H. Greer, 46, won hero awards from two metropolitan dailies and an upgrade in rank for risking his life to capture an armed desperado.

He was walking his boxer dog near his home about 1:15 A. M. when he heard a woman's screams coming from a doorway. Hastening to the spot, he discovered a thug holding a woman by the throat and pressing a knife against her back.

Detective Greer grappled with the man, who broke loose and ran four blocks where the officer cornered him on the roof of a five-story tenement. There the fugitive battled his pursuer and tried to push him off the roof. The detective finally subdued him with a pistol butt blow, but on the way down the stairs, he "jumped" his captor, slashing him several times. The detective finally brought him down with a bullet in the left side.

The captive was identified at Kings County Hospital as Harvey Richardson, 21, of 902 Greene Ave. His intended woman victim was found to be Sydnye Robinson, 23, of 727 McDonough St.

The hero's wife, Mrs. Nathaniel Greer, and three children, were present when he received The News and The Journal American Awards from Police Commissioner Kennedy.

**GREENSBORO** — A few more than 1,600 young musicians, members of school bands from throughout the State played their instruments most of the day Thursday, May 2, at the State School Band Music Festival held at A & T College.

Brightly uniformed, they played their hearts out before a group of judges, all with the objective of gaining a high rating for their respective units.

The horn tooting and drum beating began as early as 9:00 A. M., and many of the youngsters were still at it as late as 4:00 P. M.

Walter F. Carlson Jr., director of bands at the college, in charge of arrangements for the meet, told reporters that the representation this year was better than usual and considerably larger than in recent years.
