## Liberian Ambassador's Wife Cites Conditions In The African Republic

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — American citizens serving their government in Liberia have adopted a much friendlier attitude toward Liberians within the past year, reported Mrs. George A. Padmore, wife of the Liberian Ambassador to the United States upon her return to this country from a recent visit to Liberia.

She acclaimed this improvement in relations as one of the most heartening developments noted during her near three-month stay in Monrovia, the Capital of the Independent Republic in West Africa.

She noted also the vast progress in the building of roads, schools and private homes. A distance of 175 miles that used to require an eight-hour drive can now be covered in less than three hours. Mrs. Padmore stated, and the building of private homes and schools with all modern conveniences is on the upsurge.

Highlighting her trip were the recent visits to Liberia of two distinguished Americans and their wives, Vice President and

Mrs. Richard M. Nixon and Governor and Mrs. Theodore R. McKeldin of Maryland.

The Nixons spent a few days in Liberia following the new national celebration of Ghana. The McKeldins were there to participate in the Maryland County Centennial celebration.

Maryland County in Liberia was sponsored by the Maryland Colonization Society of America. Mrs. Padmore spoke enthusiastically of the "whole-hearted warm reception" accorded both the Nixons and McKeldins.

## Mrs. Annie Malone, Poro College Founder, Laid To Rest In Chicago

**CHICAGO (AP)** — Scores of dignitaries and friends of the beauty culturist profession paid final tribute Wednesday to Mrs. Annie M. Turbino-Malone, once regarded as the world's richest Negro woman with assets estimated at several million dollars.

Mrs. Malone, inventor of many hair straighteners as well as the pressing comb, died last Friday in Provident Hospital here of natural causes due to old age. She was 87.

Funeral services for the noted founder of Poro College here were conducted at Bethel A.M.E. church. Rites were impressive and led by the Rev. A. Wayman Ward, Mrs. Malone's former pastor.

 With Mrs. Malone's death came the last of the pioneer beauticians and the woman who advanced the profession toward its apex.

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Mrs. Malone set up Poro College in St. Louis in 1902 and later established beauty schools in 12 other states. In 1938 she moved to Chicago and bought the entire east side block from 44th to 45th street on South Parkway.

Her wealth at death was estimated at around \$100,000 in property and cash.

Mrs. Malone was known to be a great giver, donating large sums of money to charities of all kinds, including orphan's homes and colleges. At one time she donated annually to virtually every orphanage in America and had two full-time scholarship students in every land grant college in the country.

Nineteen nieces and nephews survive Mrs. Malone. Burial was in Burr Oak cemetery.

### DEVELOPS PRESSING IRON

Mrs. Malone became the first person to develop and patent the pressing iron and comb. Her successful enterprises also yielded fabulous profits and was recognized once as the world's richest Negro woman.

Complications set in, however, as she was unable to find honest and capable personnel to operate her huge hair preparation empire after she had established the Poro College and related institutions in some 12 different states.

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
