### 2nd Quarterly Mass Meet Of AME Zion Church Held In N. C.

### Negro Vote In Georgia Proves Highly Potent

ATLANTA (AP)—The tremendous potency of the Negro vote here was felt last week in the Democratic primary elections as a Negro was re-elected to the Board of Education, a run-off election was forced between a white and Negro candidate in the alderman race, and renomination of a mayor considered "100 to 1" to Negroes was effected. Because of the powerful Negro vote, Dr. Rufus E. Clement, president of Atlanta university, was renominated to the board of education. The same Negro vote caused a run-off election between

T. M. Alexander, 48-year-old Negro insurance executive and Jack Summers, a white business man, two candidates in a race for alderman here. If Alexander wins in the May 27 run-off, he'll be the first Negro alderman since 1871.

Mrs. M. Elizabeth Carnage, associate editor of NURSING OUTLOOK, the official publication of the National League of Nursing, is the finals speaker. She will speak at the concluding program to be held outdoors in the College Quadrangle on Monday afternoon, June 3 at 4:00 o'clock.

The commencement program is to be delivered by Dr. G. Bromley Oxnam, presiding bishop, the Washington (D. C.) Area of the Methodist Church. This program is to be held in the Harrison Auditorium on Sunday, June 2, beginning at 11:00 A. M.

Other events scheduled for the three-day activities include Senior Class Day Exercises, Herndon Auditorium at 4:00 P. M. and the annual reception for the graduating classes alumni and friends given by Dr. Wainwright T. Gluba, president of the College and area clubs, at 7:00 P. M. all on Saturday, an open air concert by the A&T College Choir on Sunday evening at 8:00 P. M. and the annual concert by the A&T College Symphony Band on Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock.

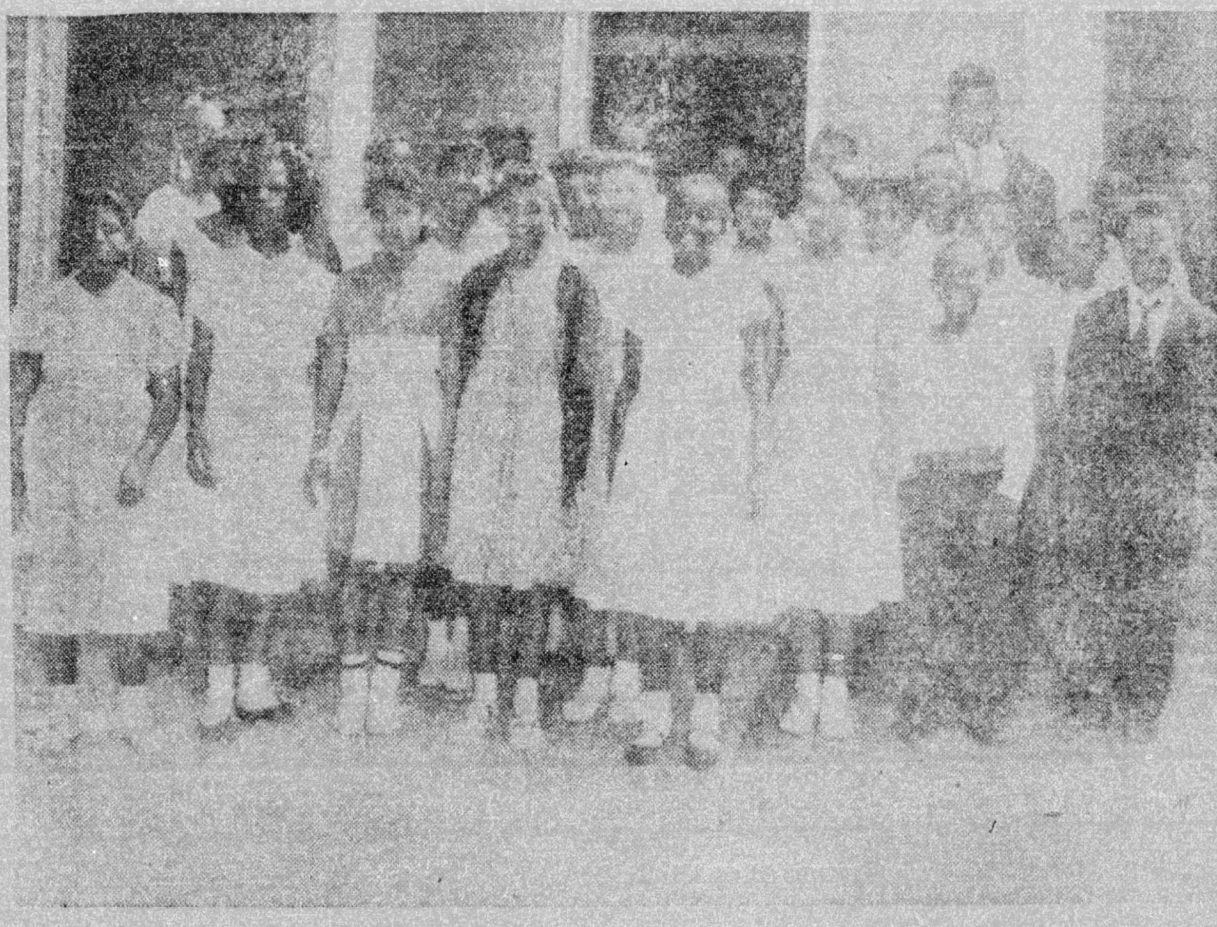
The annual Art Exhibition, featuring productions by students in the department of art begins on Friday, May 24, and extends through the commencement exercises.

### Boxcar Death Creates A Big Stir In Tennessee

MEMPHIS (AP)—The death of an unidentified Negro man in a freight train boxcar last week caused a stir among local residents and prompted police in two cities to begin investigations into the case. The man was found dead in the boxcar shortly after it arrived

in Nashville from Birmingham. Described as about 40, the man had been shot in both legs and apparently had bled to death, according to investigators. A Railway Express receipt bearing the name "Florence Williams" Memphis, was found in his pocket.
