

Detective's Daughter Held For Murder

Girl, 13, Nabbed In One-Year-Old Feud Shooting

NEW YORK (AP) — Benny Francis, 13, daughter of an honor detective, was held in the slaying of two girls last Monday, climaxing a feud existing since last summer. Gwendolyn Smith, 14, died of her wound and Herman Jackson was confined in Harlem Hospital in a critical condition with a bullet in her neck.

The shooting occurred on the grounds of the Lincoln Housing project where the girls lived. Francis was reported to have set her father's revolver after being provoked.

She returned and said she shot the Jackson girl after she threatened to cut her. She alleged Gwendolyn was wounded when she tried to get possession of the .38 calibre revolver. The gun was found in her dead girl's hand. Her mother is 33 years old.

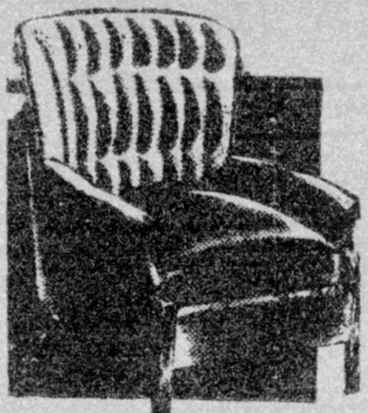

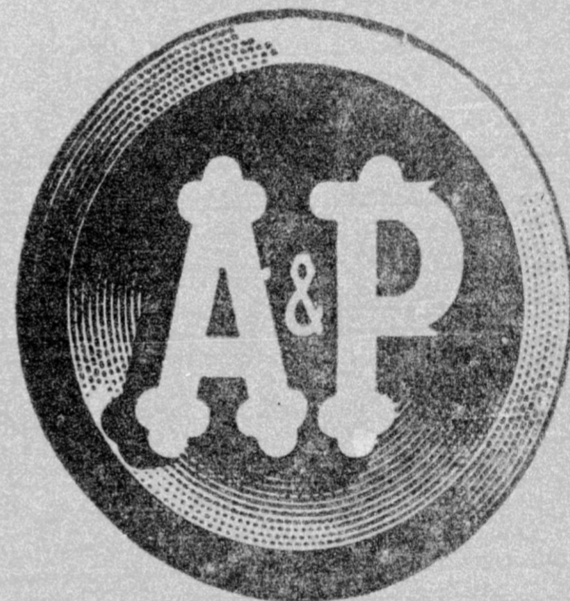
