Baptist Youth Seminar Opens At Virginia Union U. July 1st

RICHMOND, VA. — According to the Reverend Wendell C. Somerville, executive secretary of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, the Fourth Annual Lott Carey Youth Seminar will be held at Virginia Union University, Richmond, Virginia, July 1-7.

The purpose of the seminar, according to Dr. Somerville is: "To give youth a world-wide view of current problems to offer a Christian approach and technique create and awaken in youth a sense of responsibility as Christians."

Four major problems which confront youth will be presented during this significant Conference. Among the topics discussed will be: (1) Beliefs that matter; (2) Problems of Social Hygiene; (3) Christian Careers and (4) World Brotherhood.

In your glacks wardrobe on its last legs? Suggest a pair of new featherweight cool trousers that shed stains and wrinkles with ease.

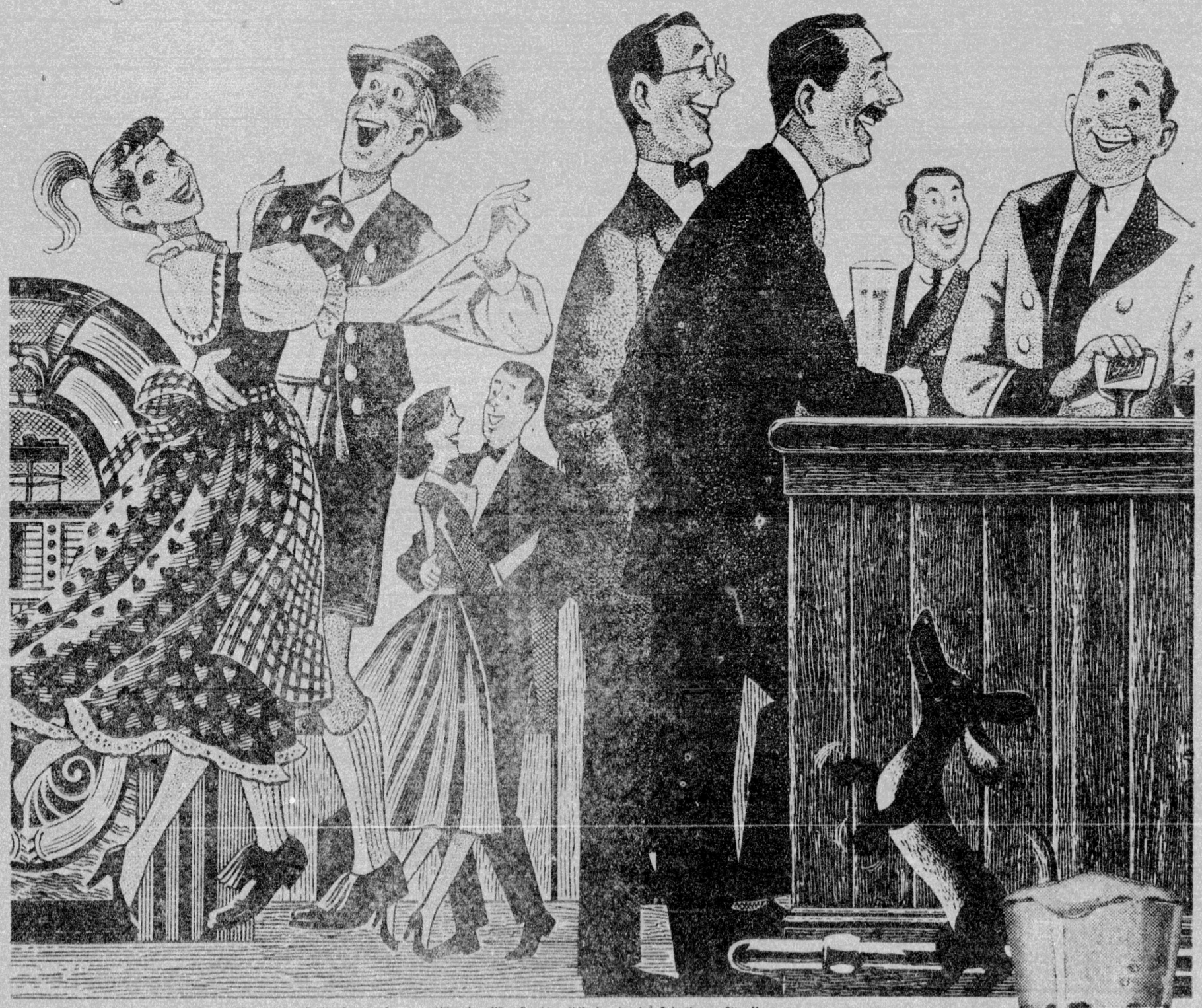
