Say Philly School Districts Are Practicing Segregation

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — Two school districts - both in Chester county - are still practicing segregation, despite a 1939 law which prohibits the practice.

The two districts are the Coatesville and Kennet Consolidated School Districts, which include Kennet Square and Kennet Township.

In releasing the results of the survey, school officials and teachers in the two districts are still practicing segregation.

They also are taking steps to bring the districts into compliance with the law.

His school systems had integrated schools.

Segregation was also reported in the Steelton-Highspire Joint District.

When the survey results were first announced, the three segregated areas were not identified. Insisting that the identities were confidential information, Dr. Charles H. Boehm, Superintendent of Public Instruction, referred further questions to Gov. George M. Leader.

A supplementary statement which named the three districts was issued on June 1st, 1951.

Boehm also being taken to all states segregation practices in their schools a later statement said.

M. E. Fretzmann, reporting principal, declares that complete integration will be developed by Sept. 1957, the statement said. The Kennet Consolidated School District reports segregation of 50 third grade students and two teachers.

"Segregation is existing in the James Adams Junior High School and in the elementary school of the Coatesville City District. The superintendent reports the condition in the elementary school will be changed to one of integration by redistricting attendance areas."

Howard University To Confer Honorary Degrees, On Jackie, Dr. King, Pat Malin

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Howard University will confer honorary degrees on three distinguished citizens at its 99th annual Commencement Friday, June 7th. They are Dr. Martin Luther King, pastor of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church, Montgomery, Ala.; Patrick Murphy Malin, director of the American Civil Liberties Union; and the late Capt. Charles Robinson, who died in 1948.

The Commencement address will be delivered by Mr. Malin.

Commencement exercises begin at 5:50 p. m. and will be held on the main campus in Memorial Hall in case of inclement weather the exercises will be moved to Constitution Hall, Eighteenth and D Streets, Northwest.

Dr. King came into the national spotlight last year as president of the Montgomery Improvement Association. Under his leadership the Negro citizens of Montgomery waged a boycott against the public buses in that city in protest against discriminatory seating and treatment. The boycott, which proved 99 per cent effective, was lifted later during the year when the U. S. Supreme Court outlawed segregation on public carriers.

The 25-year-old Dr. King holds the Bachelor of Arts degree from Morehouse College (Ga.), the Bachelor degree from Crozier Theological Seminary (Pa.), where he was named the school's outstanding student, and the Doctor of Philosophy degree from Boston University.

Calypso Tops Rock 'N Roll In Germany

Other reports coming from across the Channel is that Winifred Atwill, the favorite of piano boogie lovers, has a new one out on Decca label, "Bumble Boogie". She also has "St. Louis Blues", and they are on 45 rpm and 78 rpm.

Reports from "home" tell us that Manhattan station, WOB is sending its top-lay commentators, Joan Shepherd on a monthly tour of Europe. 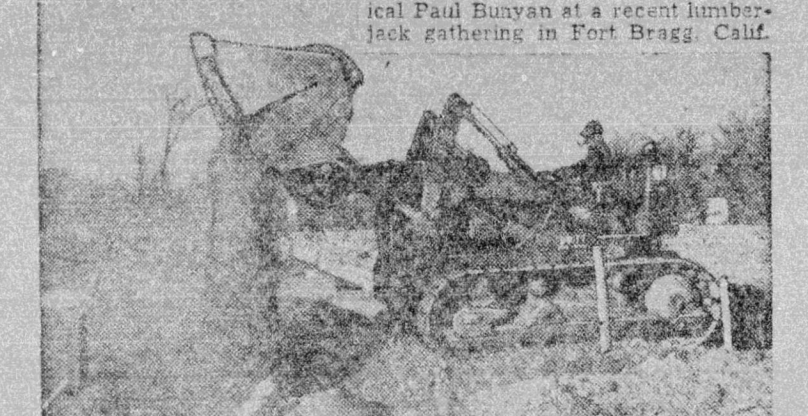
Big-Time Producers
