Senate Votes Supplementary Appropriation For Freedom's Hospital In Washington, D. C.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Wednesday agreed to appropriate an additional \$92,890 to Freedom's Hospital to supplement operating expenses during the remainder of this fiscal year ending June 30, 1957. This appropriation includes \$43,400 for salaries and expenses, \$23,000 for elevator and \$26,490 for a new X-ray machine. These appropriation figures were approved earlier by the House of Representatives and sent through the Senate.

House conference unchanged. The conference report was approved by the Senate and the bill has been sent to the President for his signature. In commenting on the Freedom's Hospital appropriation, the conference report stated that the amount allocated for salaries and expenses was \$13,000 less than the amount requested. The \$13,000 had been requested for the employment of 23 additional nursing positions. Since the patient load has not increased since last year, the report stated, the committee disallowed this item.

On the second item, the committee reported that a fire occurred in one of the elevators last November which called attention to the need for repairs. Since this need is obvious and the committee has no desire to interfere with the efficiency of this hospital this item was allowed.

It has been obvious for a long time, the report stated, that the X-ray machine at Freedom's needed replacement. So the committee approved the third item rather than endanger the employees and patients. The conference committee, however, charged Freedom's with

"haphazard budgeting." If it had an increased patient load and needed additional nurses, stated the report, it should have included this request in its regular annual budget for 1957. If it needed additional money for elevator repairs it should have sent this request to Congress earlier. As for the request for funds for a new X-ray machine, Congress claimed that "Under orderly budgeting this item would certainly have been provided for in the regular budget rather than require everyone concerned to handle it as a special item in a supplemental."

This was the third supplemental appropriation bill for 1957 passed by Congress. Freedom's Hospital is operated predominantly by Negro personnel and services chiefly Negro patients. It is operated under the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

EXTEND STRAWBERRY SEASON WITH JAM

Strawberries are so pretty and so good we like for them to last as long as possible. One of the best ways to extend their season is to make strawberry jam. Can you think of more delightful eating now and later than hot biscuits or rolls and homemade strawberry jam? No? Then let's get along with our jam-making.

The modern way to make jam is so quick and easy even the busiest homemaker can find time to make some for her table — as well as a gift jar or so. Powdered and liquid pectins have taken all the guesswork and most of the time and trouble out of jam and jelly-making. These pectins have eliminated the long boiling which not only was time-consuming due to watching and stirring, but it boiled much of the fresh fruit color and flavor away. How much prettier and more flavorful are our modern homemade jams made the short-boil way, adding pectin for a sure and perfect set! Here is a recipe you will treasure, based on powdered fruit pectin.

STRAWBERRY JAM
Yield: About 11 Medium Glasses (5 1-2 lbs.) Jam
4 1-2 cups prepared fruit, about 2 qts. ripe strawberries
7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar
1 box (2 1-2 oz.) powdered fruit pectin

First: prepare the fruit. Crush completely, one layer at a time, about 2 quarts fully ripe strawberries. Measure 4 1-2 cups into a Very Large Saucepan. Then make the jam. Measure sugar and set aside. Add powdered fruit pectin to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. At once stir in sugar. Bring to a BULL ROLLING BOIL and BOIL HARD FOR 1 MINUTE, stirring constantly.

Remove from heat and skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover jam at once with 1-4 inch hot paraffin.

YOUR WEEKLY TREAT RECIPE SPRING VEGETABLE SALAD

A salad to be enjoyed should be attractive to look at, crisp and fresh in appearance, and with a zestful, refreshing flavor. The following salad with its special dressing qualifies on all counts.

2 cups shredded lettuce
2 cups shredded spinach
6 green onions
12 small radishes
Tomato-French dressing.
Tear spinach and lettuce in manageable pieces and slice green onions very thin. Slice radishes, but not so thin that the red color disappears. Mix all ingredients and store in Cellophane bag until just before serving. Blend with salad dressing and serve.

TOMATO-FRENCH DRESSING: In a fruit jar, place the following ingredients:
1 1/2 cup tomato soup, 1-2 cup salad oil, 1-2 cup mild vinegar, 2 teaspoons sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, and 2 teaspoons horseradish.

Banks, Insurance Firms To Integrate White Collar Staffs

NEW YORK — (AP) — Four major Brooklyn banks and two insurance companies integrated the white collar staffs, with the advice and assistance of the Urban League. It was revealed Monday, by Marold Goldberg, chairman of the

League's Brooklyn Industrial Relations Committee. The Dime Savings Bank of Brooklyn has employed George H. Brown, 19, Boys High School June Graduate, as a trainee in the audit department

The Lafayette National Bank has hired three Urban League referrals: A special interest teller at the Bedford branch; an Archives clerk at the Bay View branch in the main office, East Parkway branch and a son. Brooklyn Savings Bank, Aetna Insurance Company and All-State Insurance Company have interviewed and pledged to employ referrals when they graduate this month. Last year, the Brooklyn industrial relations committee, under

the direction of Dr. Richard Allaway, made a survey of Brooklyn Banks and insurance companies to determine the extent of integration. These institutions employ large numbers of high school graduates. The findings of the survey showed that, unlike Manhattan, there was little or no integration. Several meetings were held between Urban League representatives and banking and insurance officials. All officials declared they would welcome qualified Negro applicants.

Hate Group With Same Ideas Changes Name

TAMPA, Fla. — (AP) — The only thing different about a group of recently merged members of the Ku Klux Klan here is their name. Their purpose of fostering white supremacy apparently remains the same.

Such was the state of affairs here last week as W. J. Griffin, head of the recently consolidated groups announced that the hate group had given themselves the name of the Bedford Forest Ku Klux Klans. Formed by consolidation of two klans, the new-named group took its name from Bedford Forest, a confederate cavalry general, who allegedly formed the first Klan following the Civil War.

hate group arose as Griffin hotly denied charges by another segregationist that he was booted out of the Klan in 1949. Imperial Wizard of the U. S. Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, E. L. Edwards of Atlanta Ga., made the charges.
