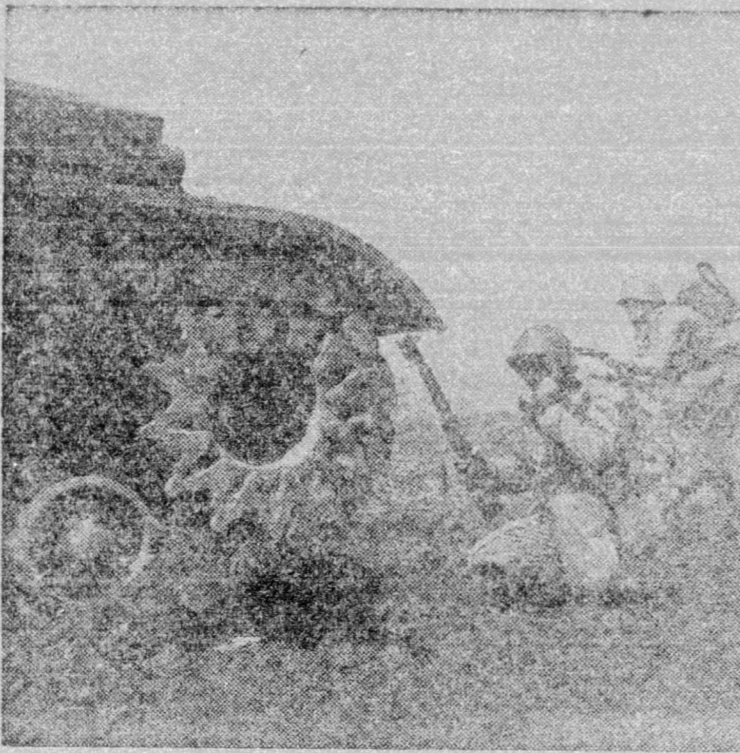

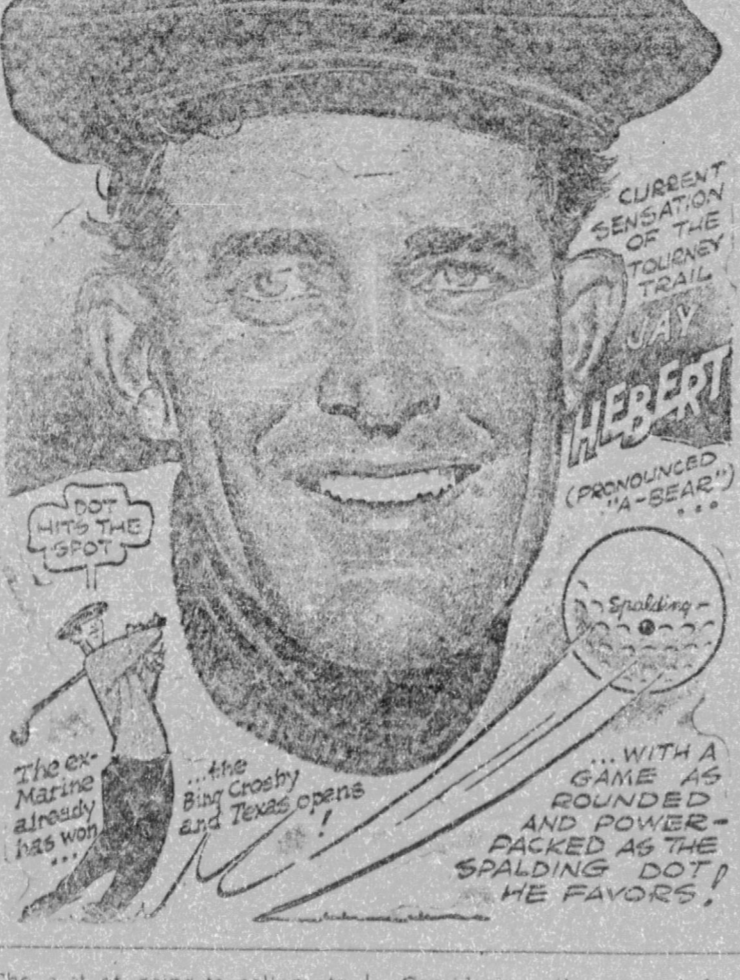
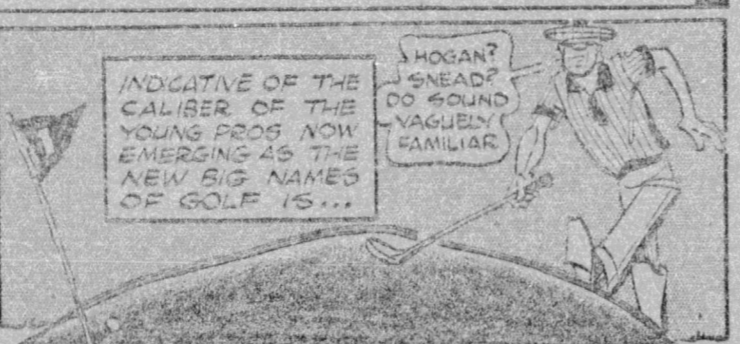

Arkansas Methodists O. K. Integration, But Gradually

ROGERS, Ark. — (ANP) — The mixing of white and Negro administrative officers of the Methodist church received the 20 signal from the Northern Arkansas Methodist Conference here last week under the stipulation that integration comes about gradually.

The legislation allowing integration would be permissive but not mandatory. It was approved by a 173 to 10 vote of the Conference at its 122 annual meeting at the Central Methodist church here.

The integration move would affect Methodist administrative offices throughout the country by becoming an amendment to the constitution of the Methodist church. The proposed amendment was suggested by the Church's General Conference last year and was sent to the annual conference for consideration.

The amendment provides that a Negro could leave the all-Negro Central Jurisdiction and become a part of one of the five white jurisdictions of two-thirds of the membership of both the Central Jurisdiction and the Jurisdiction to which the church wanted to be transferred gave approval.

PETERSBURG, Va. — The Second Annual Meeting of the Virginia Home Economics Association will be held at Virginia State College at 2:30 P. M. on June 27. It was announced today by officials of the association.

Chief speaker for the occasion will be Mr. C. W. Seay, Principal, Dunbar High School, Lynchburg. Mr. Seay's topic will be "Growing Professionally."

The Association Meeting is being held during the Second Annual State Conference of Vocational and Practical Arts Personnel which will be held at the College in June 24-28.

The membership of the association is composed of the Home Economics teachers in the elementary and secondary schools in the state of Virginia.
