## White Students Enroll At Miss. Negro College To Study Race

WEST POINT, MISS.—(AP)—In spite of public opinion and attitudes here concerning race, a group of white students from Kansas University last week spent their two week vacation by enrolling at a Negro Junior College here to study race relations.

The action caused an immediate stir among advocates of white supremacy and gave rise to discomfort within the West Point Citizens Council.

Dwelling in the same dormitories, doing mental chores side by

side with Negro students and endeavoring a friendly atmosphere, the Kansas University student group, including five white women indicated they are completely content at the Mary Holmes Junior College for Negroes.

The group said they are doing mental chores because they believe labor "generates a spirit of dignity."

Irate pro-segregationists, angered by widespread publicity of the event, stood by heatedly taking note of the situation.
