Six Ways Introduced:

Protestants Move To Expedite Integration

NEW YORK (AP)—Six ways to expedite and extend church integration here was formulated last week by the Protestant Council of the City of New York.

The council's race relations committee adopted the measures from an earlier survey of the racial situation in churches of the Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan and Richmond.

- 1. The employment of a minority race co-pastor, assistant pastor or church worker.
- 2. Recommendation of parishioners of minority races to real estate men and the smaller local landlords for purchase or rental of housing units.
- 3. A "never-flagging evangelistic effort" among peoples of the parish area, "recognizing honestly that people of the minority group need more than cursory conscience-satisfying visits."
- 4. A concerted effort through sermons, discussion groups and visiting between white and non-white churches to "arouse the Christian witness of each church in its race relations."
- 5. Establishment of small, interdenominational area church councils to assess interracial problems and proclaim "a welcome to Christian brotherhood."
- 6. The development of interdenominational comity committees to persuade minority group churches not to establish one-race churches.

Dr. Downing Heads Catawba Synod; Rev. George Reports On Pakistan

CONCORD — The 70th annual meeting of the Catawba Synod, its training conference and the Catawba Synodical Society, in cooperation with the Catawba Presbyterian Men's Council presented a five-day program of religious training activity and reports on the year's work June 17-21 at Barber-Scotts College.

Dr. Ellsworth D. Downing, Roanoke, Va., dentist, was elected as moderator to succeed the Rev. Samuel J. McLean, Charlotte, retiring moderator.

The pre-synod, or training features the first two days of the meeting with four seminars being conducted by staff members of the Presbyterian Church USA. The Revs. James E. Henry, Russell Rice, H. S. Randolph, Gayraud, Wilmore, David Swartz, Archie E. Pieper and Donald G. Lester instructed in Christian Education, evangelism, church manpower and social education and action. Governors for

these programs included: Revs. O. J. Hawkins, Paul E. Davis, J. E. McMillan, G. Elwood Boulware, G. Dwight Nelson, D. G. Burke and Misses William Powell and Rachel Swann.

Memorial services were held for the following deceased members of the synod: the Revs. E. J. George and W. A. Hawkins. The Communion services were directed by Revs. H. Wilson, C. A. Kearns and J. H. Costen.

Easily the highlight of the synod was the joint Synodical-Presbyterian Men's Council "popular meeting" on Thursday night which featured an address by the Rev. Bryant George, Charlotte, a returned missionary to Pakistan, who gave a vivid account of conditions in that far-away country as gained by his three years spent there. (This will be reported on in another article.)

Mrs. Vera Murphy, Danville, Va., President of the Synodical Society, presented Mrs. Louis Foster, a resource use staff member of the Women's department of mission work, who said: "Nothing happens

in the Presbyterian Church unless it happens in the local Church," she warned that "Presbyterian Women's Organization (PWO)" is not a "tag party" for social activity. She continued, "The motto of Kingdom building does not necessarily mean going two feet off Africa, but so many people think it could be right in your own home, community, church, or state." Mrs. Lester concluded that "Women's work of witnessing for Christ is 'big business'."

Elder C. E. Boulware urged the men to match the women and children in witnessing for Christ, stressing that God wants personal service as well as money in Kingdom building.

Retired former Synod secretary, Dr. Frank Shirley, despite his illness from which he is greatly recovered — was active in synod debate.

The Rev. E. L. Henderson, Catawba Synod Field Representative, was in overall charge of the promotion of the total program of Church the synod level.
