

Brother Helps Brother: Donates To One Kidney Twin

Doomed Youth, 19, Saved By Own Brother's Kidney

BOSTON, Mass. (ANP) — In a case that drew wide-scale medical attention recently, doctors last week here performed a successful kidney operation on Leon Masden, after his twin brother had donated young Masden his kidney.

The operation was performed in Peter Bent Brigham Hospital here where the 19-year-old ailing youth was suffering with two diseased kidneys which eventually will be removed in separate operations.

In the kidney transplant operation, Leon's twin brother, Leonard, donated a normal kidney to his stricken brother. Doctors performing the opera-

tion worked in adjoining operating rooms where one group removed the kidney from Leonard's body and the other group transplanted it in Leon's body.

The identical twin boys are the sons of Mrs. Flaggie Masden of Shepherdsville, Ky.

Legal procedure was necessary before the operation could be performed and doctors joined the case with Mrs. Masden and the boys in requesting permission from the court. Court litigation in the matter was necessary because Leonard, the donor, was a minor and unable to authorize the operation.

NAACP Given Time To Submit Virginia Records

RICHMOND, Va. (ANP) — Attempts by the NAACP to gain additional time in its fight against the Boatwright committee here in regard to opening its records to the state proved fruitful last week as the civil rights group was granted a stay until early July.

The action came after NAACP attorneys filed notices to have subpoenas against the group invalidated.

In Richmond Circuit court,

Judge Edmund W. Honing set July 3 as a hearing date in the case. The subpoenas called for the equality group to produce to the state records, correspondence and financial data dating back to December, 1949.

Motions filed by NAACP attorneys Oliver W. Hill and Martin A. Martin maintained that the subpoenas were "far too broad" to meet the test of constitutional reasonableness.

Record Catholic Membership Reported; Is Up 90 Per Cent

WASHINGTON—(ANP)—A record 520,702 American Catholics are now members of the Roman Catholic Church, according to a report of the Commission for Catholic Missions Among Colored People and Indians.

The figure, the commission said, represents an increase of 90 per cent during the past 25 years.

Emphasizing the speed at which Negroes are embracing the Catholic faith, the report states that they are being converted at the rate of 1,000 each month, with the largest groups coming from New York, Philadelphia, Washington, D. C., St. Louis, Detroit and Los Angeles. Last year alone, there were 10,563 converts.

The report also listed a total of 117,261 American Indians in the faith.

In another phase of the report, 65,000 Negro children are said to be enrolled in 345 parochial schools in 65 dioceses. In all but a few of these dioceses, the percentage of Negro children enrolled in such schools is higher than that of white children.

The commission also indicated an interest in the social needs of Negroes and Indians migrating to the larger cities. It called upon Catholic parishes in western and midwestern cities to take a special interest in the spiritual and economic welfare of the "steady stream"

White Wife Of Negro Sues Cafe For Dance Floor Bias

WASHINGTON (ANP) — Mrs. Leopoldine M. Tynes, white wife of a Negro, filed a \$25,000 damage suit against the Moulin Rouge restaurant here last week, charging that the management would not permit the couple to dance together "on the ground that mixed dancing was not allowed."

The Tynes' suit said actions by employees, and the proprietor, Pandora P. Gozes, caused the woman embarrassment and humiliation and interfered with the couple's marriage relations.

The owner admitted interrupting the dance — last November 22 — but only to ask Tynes to take his hat off.

Red Carpet And Jim Crow Signs Rolled Out At Va. Naval Review

NORFOLK, Va. (ANP)—Virginia rolled out the red carpet for its visiting guests of 18 nations for the international Naval Review in Hampton Roads last week but there were evidences in some places of race prejudice and segregation.

The segregation notices were written in French, Spanish, Danish, Portuguese, Italian, and three other foreign languages.

There were no signs in either English or German, but care was taken to use the language of sailors and Naval officers from countries with dark skinned people or integrated naval groups.

The public gave the dark-skinned visitors a warm welcome, but the Trailways Company which has been a bitter foe of integration, sought to keep the races separate in the use of its facilities.

Segregation signs were posted on the entrances to toilets for men and women at the Carolina Trailways station in Norfolk. Though Negro passengers are permitted now to sit in the white waiting room, very few use the room and whites use it exclusively as they did before the court decision against segregation at bus terminals and trains.
