REV. JAMES HARROD, 82, BURIED IN VIRGINIA; SURVIVORS IN N. C.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va. — It was a standing-room-only for many who were late in getting to Calvary Congregational Christian Church, 34th Street and Roanoke Avenue, June 24th for the funeral of the Reverend James Henry B. C. Harrod, 82-year-old founder and pastor emeritus of the church. The Rev. Mr. Harrod was known as a life-long Christian gentleman, having engaged in religious activity since he was 14. He organized the Church which he was destined to pastor the remainder of his life — in 1906. He had only been relieved of the active pastorate during recent years due to ill health.

Local NAACP Prexy: Rev. Isaac B. Horton, Raleigh, To Assume Chadbourne Pastorates

The Rev. Isaac B. Horton is scheduled to preach his farewell sermon to the Juniper Level Baptist Church Sunday, July 7. Rev. Horton, who has been pastor of the church since January, 1956, has recently been called to pastor the Stephens Baptist Church at Chadbourne and the Friendship Baptist Church at Whiteville. The two churches are located seven miles apart and will hold service every other Sunday. The minister will reside in Chadbourne.

The subject of Rev. Horton's farewell sermon will be: "Abide in Me". The sermon will be based on the scripture text found in St. John 15:4 "Abide in me and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can ye, except ye abide in me." The Rev. Mr. Horton is a native of Raleigh and is the son of the Rev. Mr. Avery Horton, also of this city. He is a 1955 graduate of Shaw University with the A. B. degree, is married and the father of one son. He is also the pastor of the Perry Chapel Baptist Church at Centerville, North Carolina and has also served as the president of the Raleigh Branch of NAACP since 1955. He is now a senior in the School of Religion at Shaw University.

Industries Announce \$67 Million Plans in C. P. & L. Area Sites

Planned investments totaling \$67,267,000 have been announced in the past six months by industries planning new plants and expansions in the two-state area served by Carolina Power and Light Company. Dan E. Stewart, manager of CP&L's area development department, said today that the \$67 million figure for the first half of the year exceeds, by over \$5 million, total new plant and expansion expenditures announced in the CP&L system in 1956.

While the most important single announcement this year came from Allied-Kenecott Titanium Corp., which plans to construct a \$40 million new plant near Wilmington, headquarters of CP&L's Eastern Division, other major national firms selecting Carolina sites include Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Co., American Cyanamid, Ex-Cello Corporation, Proctor and Schwartz, A&M Karagheusian and Oak River Mills.

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Bishop Is Ousted At Terminal BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (ANP) — Bishop R. R. Wright, president of the powerful A.M.E. Church Bishops Council and presiding bishop of the Eighth A.M.E. Episcopal District, stated last week that he was ousted from a general waiting room in this city's railroad terminal while enroute from Philadelphia to New Orleans.
