He added, "If America wants to maintain its world leadership we've got to see to it that every man has a real chance."

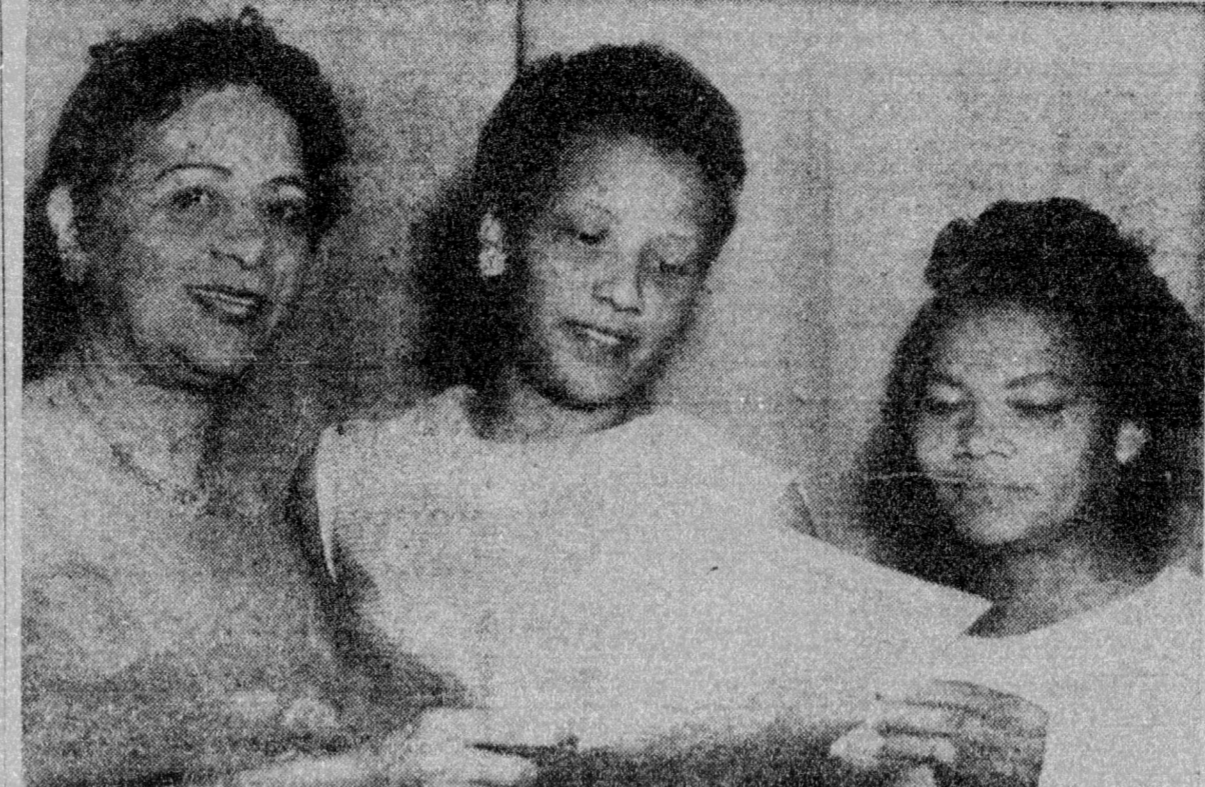

## Educator Says Future Will Shame America Over Integration Furor

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (ANP)—"We will be ashamed of the hysteria we've shown over the U. S. Supreme Court decision outlawing segregation in public schools in the future, according to a Berea College board member who stated that the ruling "caught us short on information about white and colored people in this country."

The speaker was Dr. W. D. Weatherford, vice-chairman of the board of trustees of Berea College, Berea, Ky., and the author of some 16 books. Dr. Weatherford addressed the Kiwanis Club at the Brown hotel here.
