

He stated, "the Civil War was fought to free the Negro from political and economic bondage but we have well nigh fastened on the Negro a social and religious bondage for the past 100 years."

The educator said that before the Civil War there was nothing strange about seeing Negroes and whites worshiping side by side in the same church. He declared that in 1842 the Walnut Street Baptist Church here had a membership of 509 Negroes and 297 whites.

He added, "if Amrecia wants to maintain its world leadership we've got to see to it that every man has a real chance."


