



# Baptist Leaders Coy Over Presidency Of NBC, Inc.

NEW YORK (ANP) — Baptist leaders representing the South and the North sought to ease a rumor of possible disunity in the ranks of the National Baptist Convention, U. S. A. Inc. Three prominent ministers were interviewed by an Associated Negro Press correspondent following the "Honor Day" event last Sunday at Abyssinian Baptist Church.

The writer button-holed two state convention leaders and a regional vice president, the former, Dr. Sandy F. Ray of Cornerstone Church, Brooklyn, and Dr. William Holmes Borders of Wheat Street Church, Atlanta; and the latter, Dr. Gardiner C. Taylor of Concord Church, Brooklyn.

Though each of the three men has been prominently mentioned as presidential timber for the National Baptist Convention, they refused to discuss this issue other than to say that it was a rare honor for any man to be chosen to lead the oldest and largest Baptist organization.

**FACE VITAL ISSUES**  
Questioned concerning the coming national convention in Louisville September 3-8, they concurred that the Convention is in a state of uneasiness due to the tenure rule in the Constitution, which would restrict Dr. J. H. Jackson of Chicago from running for a fifth term.

The prominent Baptist ministers agreed that the uppermost matter facing the session will be the reaffirming of unity among the leadership of the organization and the determination of the strength and integrity of the constitution.

# American Scouts To Be Represented By 1,745 Persons At England Fest

The Boy Scouts of America will be represented by 1,745 Scouts and Leaders at the Jubilee Jamboree at Sutton Park, Warwickshire, England, from August 1 to 12, according to word received by Scout Executive S. P. Gaskin of the Oconeechee Council from Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, Chief Scout Executive. About 35,000 boys and Leaders from most of the 62 nations with Boy Scout Associations will camp together a great assembly of the free youth of the world.

The Jubilee Jamboree will commemorate the 100th anniversary of the birth of Lord Baden-Powell of Gilwell, Chief Scout of the World, founder of Scouting, and the 50th anniversary of the Scout movement, which was founded by Baden-Powell in 1907.

The Oconeechee Council will be represented at the Jubilee Jamboree by 6 Explorers Scouts. They are: Richard Fowler of Durham, Johnny McMillan of Southern Pines, Allison Stubbs of Durham, Joe Todd of Fayetteville, Eric Michaux of Durham, and Johnny Grier of Pinehurst. They will sail aboard the S. S. "Castel Felice" of the Sitar Line, landing its Scout Party at Plymouth, England, on July 27.

Joining those from the United States at the Jubilee Jamboree will be 96 other American Scouts and Leaders who reside in Europe. They are sons of American military, diplomatic, or business personnel and are members of the Transatlantic Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

The American boys will occupy parts of five subcamps, living side by side with Scouts of other nations, making it easy for the campers to build friendships and understanding among lads of all nations, races, and creeds. The Jamboree camp is a natural park of 2,400 acres, which was once a royal hunting ground presented in 1528 by King Henry VIII to the corporation of Sutton Coldfield. The camp is eight miles north of Birmingham, second largest city in Great Britain.

**QUEEN ELIZABETH TO VISIT CAMP**  
Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh will visit Sutton Park on Saturday, August 3. The Queen is patron of the Boy Scout Association of the British Commonwealth and Empire. Prince Philip is president of the Baden-Powell Scout-Guild, the British guild of former Scouts, and takes great and active interest in the welfare of youth.

The Duke of Gloucester, the Queen's uncle, is President of the British Boy Scouts Association. He will perform the opening ceremony of the Jubilee Jamboree on Thursday, August 1.

Lady Baden-Powell, widow of the founder, Chief Girl Guide of the World, will speak at the closing campfire ceremony, Monday, August 12. She is an honorary Vice President of the International Conference of the Boy Scout Movement.

Following the Jamboree, the United States contingent will divide into eleven parties for about two weeks of touring before sailing home from Le Havre aboard the "Castel Felice" on August 27, due in New York on September 5.

The objective of the Jubilee Jamboree is to bring together the youth of the free nations of the

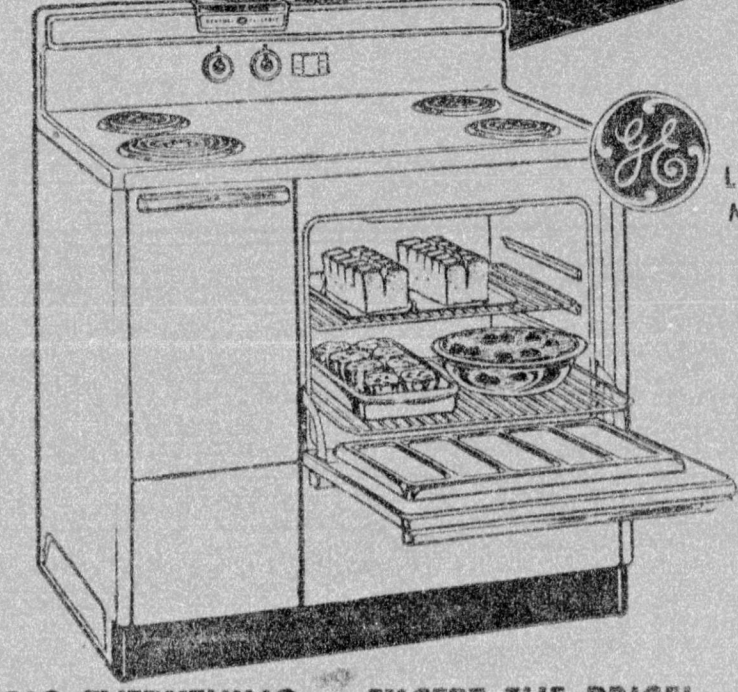
