

Chief Nurse In Lebanon For 5 Years Returns To US After Rome Meeting

WASHINGTON — Miss Mary Lee Mills, who has been Chief Nurse of the International Cooperation Administration's Mission to Lebanon for the past five years, recently returned to the U. S. via Rome, where she attended the International Congress of Nurses.

Miss Mills, who is from Watauga, North Carolina, has been the recipient of the many honors — both in Lebanon and in Liberia, where she spent five and a half years before going

to Lebanon. She recently was awarded a scholarship to attend the School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University, to study Arabic, and will attend her classes in Washington, D. C. during June, July and August. In addition to the many recognitions described in the following story printed by a Lebanese newspaper, a student nurses' dormitory in Lebanon was named Mills Hall in her honor.

An English-language newspaper in Beirut, in a feature article, said: "Miss Mary Lee Mills was awarded the Decoration of the Cedars for her valiant and generous services as advisor to the Ministry of Health of Lebanon to add to the decoration she received for yeoman service given the previous five years through the U. S. Public Health Service in Liberia, West Africa. Her gracious personality wins many friends for the projects she initiates and for the nursing profession itself, of which she is an excellent example. Her most recent occupying post has been with the new Akkassed Hospital Nursing School."

A graduate of the New York University in Nursing Education, Miss Mary Mills was recalled from her foreign duties last year in Lebanon to be further honored at Tuskegee Institute's seventy-fifth Anniversary Commencement and the honorary degree of Doctor of Science was conferred on her. U. S. Congressman Francis P. Bolton, a member of the Board of Trustees of the Tuskegee Institute, says of Miss Mills: "It was particularly proud to have her recommended for the honorary degree of Doctorate of Science." She adds: "Both Liberia and Lebanon have awarded her national medals—the first time a Public Health Service Officer has been decorated by two foreign governments."

"There is a most human story about Mary Mills that many recruits who know her may not be aware of. When Miss Mills was in Liberia, an eighteen-month-old child was brought into the children's ward which she helped to organize and establish. His being there was a last resort for he was not expected to live. But Miss Mills said she made a project of keeping him alive, and then proceeded to nurse him over the months. He did survive and later returned to his family."

But, Butch, as she named him, says Miss Bolton, so dearly loved Mary Mills that he came back to the hospital. She kept returning him to his family and he just came back running until finally she agreed to become his guardian. These complications set in when his brother wanted Miss Mills' attention also. So eventually she applied for the required authorization and brought Butch and his brother back to Watha, North Carolina, her home, where the boys live with her parents and go to school.

Miss Mills' deep regard for Lebanon and the Arabs have taken her to yet one more adventure, this time in language. She has been awarded a scholarship to attend the School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University, to study Arabic, and will attend her classes in Washington, D. C. during June, July and August.

Miss Mills' work in Lebanon is part of ICA's technical cooperation program which operates in nearly 60 countries of the free world in an effort to help the people find ways to help themselves. Speaking of this program, President Eisenhower recently said: "We do seek to help other peoples to become strong and stay free — and learn, through living in freedom, how to conquer poverty, how to know the blessings of peace, and progress. This purpose serves our own national interest."

CP&L Workers Trying To Whip "July Jinx"

Nearly 2,000 Carolina Power & Light Company employees are trying to whip their "July Jinx." That's the abnormally high accident rate of previous July.

Sparked by H. Burton Robinson, vice-president and general manager, CP&L's entire force has resolved to make July a "No Accident Month." Daily safety sessions, stress hazards encountered on normal everyday jobs where most of the accidents occur. A total of 1,900 linemen, servicemen, meter readers, substation operators and others are enlisted in the safety effort. Last July, CP&L workers had 17 accidents, says Safety Director Bill Hall.

June, July and August accounts for nearly half of the entire year's accidents. Of 103 mishaps, 24 resulted in time lost, most of it during the hottest summer months.

Josephine Baker Sues For Divorce

SARLAT, France (AP) — Josephine Baker, internationally famous singer and dancer, has filed for divorce from her band-leader husband, Jo Bouillon. Actually, in keeping with French custom, court officials in this city declined to state which party initiated the suit or to specify the grounds.

"Who's Who" Gets Big Lift At National Baptist Meeting

DALLAS, Texas — The greatest blessings are often unexpected, accidental and unsolicited. When the Editor of "Who's Who In Baptist America In the Sunday School and B. T. U. Congress," was asked to be one of the escorts for Dr. M. L. King, Jr., little did it dawn upon him that it would result in the greatest lift that this project ever had since its inception.

It happened while they sat in an office room in the great \$2 million Dollar War Memorial Building in Dallas, Texas where the National

Sunday School and BTU Congress met June 17-23. Dr. King was the feature speaker on Booker T. Washington Night. During a brief pause from newsmen, the Editor raised the question: "Dr. King, it will not honor you but it will honor us if you will become one of the subscribers to "Who's Who In Baptist America," will you do us this great honor?"

Dr. King replied: "Why, I'll be glad to Reverend Booth." It took the Editor many minutes later to realize that the project he heads had received the endorsement of one of America's greatest leaders today.

Dr. King who is only 28, has received more honors than most great men at the age of 60, and is more widely known than most men are known in a life time. It was not until Dr. W. H. Jernagin, President of the Congress spoke announcing that Dr. King approved the project, did the Editor realize that his prayers had been answered to a great extent by one of the greatest prayer advocates in the world today.
