Girl Member Of A Sepia Death Gang Released

CHICAGO (AP)—The third and final member of a three-person gang charged with the slaying of a 15-year-old Negro youth here in April won her freedom last week as criminal court Judge Harold P. O'Connell tossed out murder charges against her.

The female gang member, 17-year-old Lillian Miller, was an accomplice of David Vandersteeg, 18, and Dennis Moffitt, 18, on the night Vandersteeg admitted shot to death young Curtis Bivens, a 17-year-old Negro youth.

Vandersteeg and Moffitt were freed of charges in a case that stirred Negroes and many white persons in this city.

The Miller girl was to have been tried separately from the youths, but she allegedly turned state's witness in the trial.

WHAT'S IN A COLLEGE NAME?

ROCKY MOUNT—It is interesting to note the disclosure of Lynn Nisbet, prominent afternoon daily newspaper correspondent for Tarheelia, agent, what he termed, the need of changing the names of three State colleges for Negroes which now bear the names of their respective cities, namely: Elizabeth City State Teachers College, Fayetteville State Teachers College and Winston-Salem State Teachers College.

Newman Nisbet reasons—and not without a degree of logic—that since these colleges are not considered to serve their local areas alone (now drawing students from afar) their names should be changed so as to conform to their present functions as "regional institutions."

The writer missed Nisbet's original writings along this line, but saw his July 23rd column which discourses at length on the matter.

He would like to remind Tarheelia before they take any hasty action in changing names—that Atlanta University bears its city's name and draws students from all over the nation. Likewise Talladega College, Talladega, Ala., and New York University, the latter drawing support from all over the world. There are many others in the same category. So why change the names of the three state colleges for Negroes every 25 or 30 years?

Could it be that there is an underlying desire to divest them of the name of the city where they are located? That appears to be the answer.
