**Missionaries Win Praise In 'Look' Story**

**NEW YORK**—A Negro couple from Florida who are Methodist missionaries in Borneo were today called "pioneers skin to Jackie Robinson in baseball."

Tom Harris, an agronomist and former county farm agent, and his wife, Jennie, a school teacher, are featured in an article on "The Methodists" in the new issue of Look Magazine. The story is the first in a series on the "Story of Religions in America."

Mr. and Mrs. Harris are "outstanding among modern Methodist missionaries" the Look article reports, because they typify the highly trained specialists the Methodists are now sending abroad to supplement the work of native pastors.

In 1948, the Harries were sent to Fuhon Province, China. They were the first regularly commissioned Negro missionaries to be sent by any Christian church to an East Asian country.

"They did so splendidly there," Look notes, "that when Chinese Communists overran the area, an-
