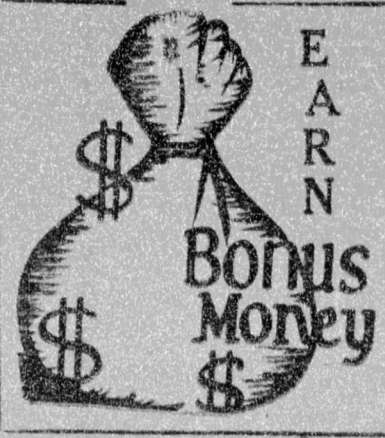

HILLSBORO—While integration rocks other southern towns and North Carolina shows no signs of having gone mad over integration in three of its principal cities, this quaint old Orange County headquarters finds itself embroiled in a factional fight as to the use of an outmoded building to house the overflow at Central High School.

LOUISVILLE, Ky.—One of the wildest demonstrations in Baptist history was witnessed here on Wednesday, Sept. 4, at the afternoon session of the National Baptist Convention, Inc., when President J. H. Jackson and his supporters by a shrewd, unexpected maneuver, had the convention's rules suspended, tenure of office overruled, resulting in Jackson's re-election by unanimous vote.
