Aaron, named All America in the issue of Look magazine out next Tuesday, polled 157 points out of a possible 163 points, making him one of the top three point-getters in the balloting.

Cardinals' Stan Musial, the high man in the voting, received 163 points and Boston's Ted Williams followed with 152 points.

Willie Mays, the Giants' power-hous, was named for the Look All National League, scoring 127 points in the poll, but lost the All America berth to Mickey Mantle who drew 145 points.
