

15 CIAA Grid Games Slated This Weekend; 3 In N. C.

From Delaware To Florida, CIAA's Leading Teams Enter Competition

Fifteen of the 18 colleges in the CIAA send football teams into action this weekend (Sept. 28) in cities stretching from Dover, Del., to Tallahassee, Fla.

The loop's three defending "champions", Morgan State, Delaware, and North Carolina College are among contestants.

Delaware entertains Bloomsburg State in a non-conference affair at Dover. And in other non-conference tilt, Morgan plays Central State in Baltimore and North Carolina invades Florida A and M at Tallahassee.

Other loop games for this week-

end include the Bluefield-Hampton scrap at Roanoke, Va.; Fayetteville and Elizabeth City at Fayetteville; St. Pauls and Howard at Lawrenceville, Va.; Tennessee A and T and North Carolina A and T at Nashville; Maryland and Virginia State at Norfolk, Va.; Shaw and Virginia Union at Raleigh, N. C.; and Winston-Salem and Kentucky State at Winston-Salem, N. C.

CIAA play opened last weekend in Durham, Fayetteville, Orangeburg, and Richmond. On October 5, play will mark the

first week of exclusive intraconference competition.

MILWAUKEE, Wis. — Hank Aaron's two run homer in the 11th inning here Monday night defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-2, and won the National League pennant for the Milwaukee Braves.

The Braves are scheduled to begin the series against the New York Yankees in New York Wednesday, October 2. The Yankees won the Amer-

ican League pennant Monday night as the second place White Sox were defeated by the Kansas City Athletics, 6-4.

Aaron's 45th homer climaxed a bitter battle before 40,926 partisan fans and gave the Braves a six game lead over the Cardinals with five games left to play.

The dramatic hit by Aaron, producing Milwaukee's first

championship since the club moved from Boston in 1953, followed a single by Johnny Logan of the third St. Louis pitcher, Billy Muffett.

The score had been tied from the seventh inning of a tense contest in which starter Lew Burdette and Card reliever Larry Jackson narked up in a tough pitcher "fight."

HAMPTON, Va. — After a number of vigorous opening sessions, Hampton Institute's hopeful young squad received the plaudits of the coaching staff who were "very pleased" with the early showings of the varsity veterans and a group of promising freshmen.

Following the initial week's workouts, Coach Ben Whaley and his assistants are putting the Fighting Pirates through the paces to develop their Split-T offensive strategy. The coach said the emphasis would be on a balanced attack utilizing speed, deception and a variety of tactics. Passing will be integrated as one phase of this diversified offense.

Coach Whaley frankly admitted that the team was lacking in power and depth. "We are not going to be in a position to rely on 'steam-roller tactics,'" he said, "and we are concentrating on getting the squad worked up to play good, smart football."

Among the returning lettermen who have displayed first squad potential in opening drills have been the Fighting Pirates' captain, George Brown, 165 point guard from Baltimore and Clyde Clock, long-fingered end from San Antonio, Texas. Center Clon Strayhorn of Trenton, N.J., is filling the important pivot position for the third straight year. There are two sophomore backs who show promise: Fullback Elton Conner from Washington, D.C. and speedy Mel Henderson, halfback, from Hackensack, N.J.

Heading the encouraging showing of newcomers are four linemen and Fred Hall, an 18 year old, 170 pound quarterback from Jacksonville, Fla., who promises to
