Last week this corner mentioned the sad note of Negro colleges and how they forget.

So many positive comments were received in connection with

the "sad note" until we decided to go a bit further into details. Very, very few Negro colleges have good active alumni associations. You can count them on one hand and have fingers left. The officials of the colleges rave about the "not interested" or "do nothing" alumni association. The college has to carry the load of the extra curricula activities, they cry . . . the college gets very little from the Association toward the athletic program, they claim, which is true, But what has the college done? They never mention that; because that would involve their negligence, and flegmationess

Our "sad note" is directed mainly at the college athletic program which is considered to be the greatest financial burden. Football, without an argument, rates number one on the financial calendar, so it is from this angle that we point the accusing finger to college

First, the average Negro college faculty is filled with degreed "nondescripts" as far as athletics is concerned. The majority of them didn't play enough, or never played any, or never was around enough to get into the campus athletic world. They were never to get an idea of how an athletic set-up is op.

rated. Now the faculty member finds himself with a degree, on a college faculty, and a member of the athletic committee. Naturally he wants to keep his job, so he doesn't tell the president that he is not equipped with the know-how of athletics, so he takes his seat on the committee as a "stumbling block."

Usually a Negro college athletic committee is composed of three or four of these know-nothing "small frys" who usually block the good thoughts of the experienced minds on the committee . . . that's Hampton Institute where he shines . . . for once in life he has a chance to buck someone that was supposed to be experienced and was supposed to know the other "nondescripts" on the committee that recognize Dr. and So's" negative suggestion, rather than his athletic intelligence. goes along with him in order to make a "thinking impression" on the President who now looks upon Dr. "So and So" as a man full of
