Brotherhood Week To Mark 25th Birthday
NEW YORK (AP)—Brotherhood Week's twenty-fifth anniversary will be observed next February 16-23 under the sponsorship of the National Conference of Christians and Jews. It was announced this week by Dr. Everett R. Clinchy, president of the organization.

Special ceremonies will mark the event which will be headed by Louis B. Seltzer, editor of The Cleveland Press, who has been named national chairman of the observance. Dr. Clinchy also announced Mr. Seltzer held the same post last year.

The annual celebration of Brotherhood Week was first suggested in 1933 by Monsignor Hugh McMenamin, a Catholic priest of Denver, who proposed that the National Conference of Christians and Jews organize a special period when Americans of all religious groups might focus their attention on the problem of living together in good will and understanding.

The idea took concrete form the following year in the celebration of "Brotherhood Day" with some 300 communities participating, according to Dr. Clinchy.

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
