State Faces No Teacher Shortage

The demand for teachers for Negro schools of the state was 330 less than the supply this number being 46 fewer than the 375 who were available in 1954-1955.

The demand for white teachers in North Carolina continues to exceed the supply turned out by colleges and universities of the state, according to the North Carolina Public School Bulletin, September, 1957.

The shortage of white teachers in 1956-1957 was 768, an increase of 119 over the shortage for 1954-1955.



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Over 50 Americans Named To Africa Study Group

NEW YORK — More than fifty prominent Americans have been named to membership on the National Committee of the American Committee on Africa. Their appointments came in response to an invitation from author John Gunther, himself a National Committee member of the organization, it was revealed at American Committee on Africa headquarters today.

The American Committee on Africa is a non-partisan, non-political organization of American citizens seeking to inform their countrymen of the historical ferment which characterizes Africa and to relate the importance of African events to American life.

"This organization," Mr. Gunther stated, "in the past two years has been the central agency for accurate and up-to-date information on African affairs. It is also the force seeking an American policy toward Africa designed to help the African peoples achieve national independence, justice and equality."

Among the new National Committee members are four U.S. Senators, two state Governors, sixteen Members of the House of Representatives, two university presidents, eight national religious leaders, and eleven authors and scholars. The new members include Gardner Cowise, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, Dr. Robert L. Johnson, Francis B. Sayre, Oscar Hammerstein II, U.S. Senators Dennis Chavez, Hubert Humphrey, Irving L. Wayne, Morse, former Ambassador Edwin E. Stanton and Angier Biddle Duke, Jackie Robinson, Sidney Poitier, Rev. Henry W. Holson, Very Rev. James A. Pike, Reinhold Niebuhr, Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, Dr. Ralph Sockman, Rev. Robert McCracken, Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., Dr. Arthur Schlesinger, Jr., Governors Edmund S. Muskie and George M. Leader.

Mr. Gunther, author of many books including "Inside Africa," noted that the new members represent a cross-section of American political, social and economic backgrounds. "This underscores our view that a broad and representative section of American leadership subscribes to the goals of national independence, justice and freedom for the African people," he said.

"In the interests of American security and world peace," Mr. Gunther emphasized, "U.S. policy must be more enlightened in respect to Africa. We must stand unequivocally for African freedom or we weaken our own. The American Committee on Africa is an instrument of substantial potential in achieving such a policy."

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Medic, Born Year Lincoln Was Assassinated, Buried

MILWAUKEE, WIS. (AP) — Funeral services were held here last week for a 22-year-old physician who was born the year President Lincoln was shot — 1865, and outlived his wife and two of his three children.

He was Dr. Allen Leonard Herron.

Dr. Herron, born in Marshall, Texas, was graduated from Howard University school of medicine here back in 1890, and since the turn of the century he had practiced in Milwaukee — at one time becoming chief anesthetist at the Milwaukee hospital.

Dr. Herron's wife and two children, a son and daughter, predeceased him in death. Another daughter, Mrs. Lucille Montgomery, a teacher in the Chicago Public School System, still survives.

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
