Well, I guess you are wondering what happened at the game? Well, we were a little unfortunate this time, but we are still going to F-I-G-H-T to W-I-N the next game.

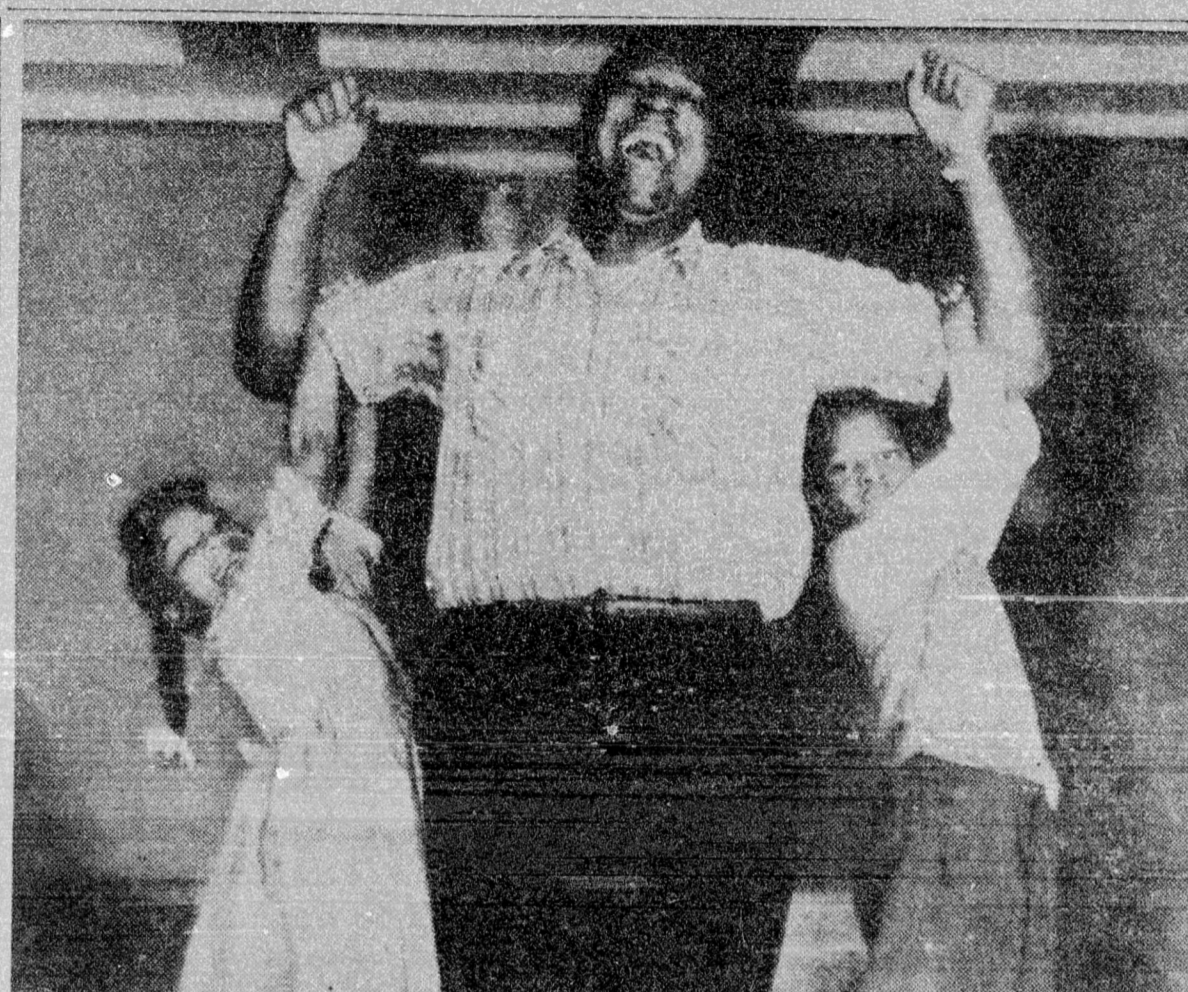

Over 400 Pay Tributes To Dr. Jernagin

WASHINGTON, D. C. — More than 400 friends from all over America paid tribute to Dr. W. H. Jernagin on his 80th birthday at a testimonial banquet at Baldwin Hall, Howard University, on Monday night, Oct. 14. The occasion was not only a birthday celebration but a celebration for his 75 years as a Christian and 65 years as a pastor.

Among those paying tribute were Max Rabb, White House Secretary, who brought personal greetings from President Eisenhower, Dr. Mordecai Johnson, President of Howard University and Rev. Edward Lewis, who brought greetings from Bishop G. Bronley Oxnam.

Other organizations having representatives present to bring greetings included the D. C. Board of Commissioners, the National Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Congress, the National Fraternal Council of Churches, the National Baptist Alliance, Virginia State Convention, American Baptist Convention, Georgia State Convention, and the Baptist State Convention of New York.

Meharry Reveals Grant Of 34 C's

NASHVILLE, TENN. — Dr. W. H. Allen, Dean of the School of Dentistry at Meharry Medical College announces receipt of a grant in the amount of \$34,500.00, from the National Institutes of Health, Bethesda, Maryland. A two (2) year study will be made to determine the relationship between dental carriers and periodontal diseases among Negro youths living under urban and rural conditions.

Other information gained from the dental examinations will be of benefit to the entire dental profession and may provide information that can be used in the future in the long search for prevention of dental disorders.

Dr. Robert L. Weiss, of the U.S. Public Health Service in Washington, D. C., who is consultant for the project was in Nashville last week, to assist in initiation and planning.

Meharry will conduct research to cover large numbers of Negro youth. This will be the first such massive study on Negroes.

Principal investigator for the research is Dr. Eugenia Mobley McGinnis, who is Associate Professor of Dentistry, and is in charge of Public Health Dentistry at Meharry Medical College.
