



Raymond Hunley New President:

Student Council Installed At St. Augustine's College

The formal installation of the student council was held at St. Augustine's College on Wednesday morning, October 16, at 9 a.m. Dr. Prezell Robinson, Dean of the college, presided and introduced Dr. James A. Boyer, President of the college who gave the purpose of the Student Council and the qualification of the members.

additional schools approved by the American Medical Association's Council on Medical Education and Hospitals.

Even with the growth of training schools, the American Occupational Therapy Association reports the need today for at least 6,000 more therapists. At present there are 1,000 registered occupational therapists in the United States, but of these only 2700 are actively engaged in the profession.

The present average age of occupational therapists is 25 years, and 98 per cent of those practicing are women. It should not be misunderstood that this is strictly a woman's profession, because there

are demands for male therapists.

Men are needed especially in programs for the mentally ill, and those sponsored by the Veterans Administration. The need for occupational therapists is great, and training facilities in most parts of the country are plentiful. But the schools which are geared to train 2,400 students a year now have only 1,800 students.

A part of the difficulty in obtaining students is that material covered is somewhat technical and scientific, covers approximately three years, and consists of a minimum of 64 semester hours of academic work, and a nine-month internship or clinical training.

Occupational Therapy
Most school counselors have little information concerning how one receives the training necessary for entrance into the field of occupational therapy. In addition, there is little information about where jobs can be found, what the opportunities are for advancement, and the personal qualifications necessary for success. Occupational therapy provides a graphic illustration of the rapid growth of the therapy professions. Up to 1942 there were only four approved schools offering training in this field.
