Shaw Prexy Installs New Student Council

The Student Council of Shaw University was officially installed for the current year recently in Greenleaf Auditorium by Dr. William E. Strasser, president.

President Strasser admonished the student leaders to be true to their obligations, loyal to the virtues for which Shaw University stands, regard their position as one of sacred trust and to execute the duties of office with efficiency. He pointed out that the greatest experiment taking place in the world today is not in scientific laboratories nor in launching satellites, but it is the experiment in democracy which is the most important.

"Democracy in our country," he declared, "still remains a noble ideal for which we are striving as we have not achieved real democracy in our country or in the world." "Education," he stated, "must be the atom as these must be manned by individuals of the highest technical training."

He informed that in our private church related colleges we find democracy is practiced. Students are given the privilege of governing themselves and should have a consciousness of what democracy means.

Frederick J. Boddie Jr., a senior of Petersburg was elected president of the Student Council. In his response to President Strasser's challenge, he pledged to rebuild the governing body at Shaw if given a chance.

Other officers installed are William Black, a senior of Tarboro, vice-president; Barbara Caviness, a senior of Washington, D. C., recording secretary; Mary E. Mayfield, a senior of Henderson, corresponding secretary; Myrtle Stetler, a junior of Greenville, assistant secretary; Roman Walton, a senior of Raleigh, treasurer; Janis Watson, a senior of Clayton, chaplain; Willie Sanford, a senior of Jacksonville, Florida, sergeant-at-arms.

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
