

# Aggies Trample Rams, 41-0; Va. State Beats Hampton

## A & T's Running Attack Whips Winston-Salem

GREENSBORO — The A and T College Aggies unleashed a powerful running attack here Saturday afternoon to subvert a hapless Winston-Salem Teachers College 41-0 in a football game played here at Memorial Stadium.

More than 8,000 spectators of the school boys and girls, many of the college at the annual High School Senior celebration, witnessed the lopsided contest.

The Aggies' first touchdown almost at the opening whistle, scored two-quickly touchdowns in the first period and piled on with two each in the third and final quarters. Three of the scores resulted as the Aggies capitalized on the mistakes of the Rams, but the fine running of Edward Neuber, Asner, Worthing and Edward Godbell, made them payoff for the winners.

In the late stages of the game, the Aggies made a drive for the end zone, but they were held short by the Rams' defense.

## Pirates Lose Second Home Encounter, 13-6

HAMPTON, Va. — Unable to withstand the powerful Virginia State College attack led by George Moody, halfback from Portsmouth, Va., the Hampton Institute Pirates went down in defeat 13-0 in their second home game of the season last Saturday.

The scoring came in the third period. A pass from DeWayne Jeter, Quarterback, to Marvin Harrell, End, from Newport News, Va., set up the 3 yard off tackle plunge for touchdown by Joe Mack, Fullback from White Plains, N. Y. A fumbled pass from center by Jeter thwarted the conversion and the score was left at 6-0.

A few minutes later the chilled crowd of about 3,500 were brought to their feet by a brilliant run by George Moody, all-CIAA back last year. He scored returning the kick the Pirates were forced to make on the 45 yard line. Jeter's kick was good and the score became 13-0.

The first quarter was marked by defensive play by both teams. Defensive play by Strayhorn, Clark and Dudley successfully bottled the Trojan running attack.

In the 2nd period two breaks came Hampton's way, but they were unable to turn them into an advantage. Along with Virginia State was called back and a 15-yard penalty against the Trojans on the 3 yard line averted a possible score.

The 4th quarter play saw several passes from Shackelford to Clark, Hampton Quarterback and End. But a fumble by the Pirates on the 1 yard line put an end to the scoring chance.

Hundreds of the approximately 4,000 Morgan alumni and thousands of others are expected to witness the traditional game between the Bears and the Aggies.

For the past few years, the Bears and Aggies have been spoiling each other's homecomings. Morgan did the dirty work last year, downing the North Carolinians 25-14.

It's Morgan's turn now to have its homecoming spoiled, but Coach Eddie Hurt is hopeful that his Bears, who've been showing plenty of teeth ever since they fought favored Maryland State to a 7-7 tie, will turn the tide.

Triple-Threat Quarterback Triple-threat quarterback Jack Dennis of Annapolis, Md., will call the signals for the Bears. ## Roberts Play Center Opens Doors To Young, Old Here

Although the time of formal dedication will be announced later, the Roberts Recreational Center is now in operation. This announcement came from the recreation center's office this week.

Activities for all age groups are being offered daily from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. Indoor activities, arts and crafts and group meetings are scheduled for persons who are interested.

The play school, a non-profit organization, opened last Monday and will be held regularly at the Center. The three-hour sessions will start at 9 a.m. and close at noon. Children between three and six years of age may enroll. The play program is made up of different activities suitable for children between 3 and 6. Activities include: arts, crafts, singing, games, dancing, hiking, drama and speech.

Each child will be required to pay a fee of 25 cents each day for enrollment in this school. The money will provide his supplies such as paper, crayons and modeling clay. Parents will be responsible for getting the children to and from the play school each day.
